Halton Health Council developing plan to support cancer services

The Halton District Health Council is commencing a study to develop a coordinated plan for the provision of cancer treatment and related support services for

Halton. The decision to undertake a study on cancer services arose out of issues identified in their recently completed Strategic Plans for Acute and Primary Care Services (hospital and community care) and on Health and Social Services for Seniors. The studies reported that in 1987 there were 870 'new cases' of cancer diagnosed in Halton. Treatment for cancer resulted in 25,000 days of hospital care for Halton residents during 1987/88. In Ontario, 80 per cent of cancers are diagnosed in persons over the age of 50. Approximately one quarter of all deaths are caused by cancer.

"People and families are often devastated when they learn of a cancer diagnosis. They are anxious to get treatment as soon as possible and usually prefer to receive that care as close to home as possible," states Marlene Longdon, executive director of the District Health Council.

The study addresses the issue that persons diagnosed with cancer need more than just treatment services. "They often need support in the form of home help, transportation, nutritional coun-

selling and information about their illness. Families also need help in the areas of information, support and, in some cases bereavement. While the community has a variety of groups and agencies involved in cancer treatment and support, there are still gaps and inadequacies. A local example is the heavy demand being experienced at Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital, the only hospital in Halton with a cancer clinic. In addition, the system requires better coordination, bringing early detection, treatment, community care, and selfhelp groups closer together into a system of care," states Longdon.

The study, being funded by the Ministry of Health and the four local Halton hospitals, commenced this month under the direction of an 18-person steering committee comprised of health and social service providers and consumers. The committee is chaired by Ms. Bonnie Brown, a past chair of the Health Council.

The Price Waterhouse consultants employed to conduct the study will use a variety of mechanisms to obtain the views of consumers and service providers regarding cancer services. 
