Publishing companies should be notified well in advance of your planned vacation to give them ample time to temporarily suspend delivery. It is wise to have such deliveries stopped one or two days in advance of your holiday so you know the cancellation is in effect."

Gardening must also be tended to while you are away. A boy in the neighbourhood is often glad of the opportunity to earn a few extra dollars by looking after the cutting and watering of your lawn. If you can not find a reliable young person, there are numerous landscaping companies equipped to do the job.

Lights should be put on a timer and if you are away for more than three or four days you should arrange for someone to change the settings periodically.

Mail and flyers should be

picked up by a neighbor so they do not accumulate around your front door, which is a sure sign that you are away.

Windows and doors should be locked and where necessary place a length of wood in the track of sliding windows and doors.

Driveways are an area that most people forget therefore you could arrange to have someone park a car in your driveway during the evening and over night.

House plants are always a major concern when on vacation. The neighbor who picks up your mail and changes the timer settings could water your plants or you can give all your plants a good soaking by placing them in the bathtub over night. Then place them in a circle on your basement floor. Place a bucket of water in the centre of the circle and cut a length of jute twice
