"Good golf begins with a good grip" - Ben Hogan

As promised, the next few weeks will be devoted to helping golfers understand the principles and fundamentals responsible for hitting the ball with more consistency. Let's begin with the grip.

The balanced grip!

In order to swing the club with a consistent swing motion and with as few compensations as possible, you must acquire a grip that enables you to place your hands on the club in a neutral position.

Your only contact with the ball is through the clubhead and your only direct physical contact with the club

is through your hands. Energy

Photo #1 brakes on all this transmission of energy. With a grip other than neutral, a golfer will not hold the club securely throughout the swing. Chances are the clubhead will be all twisted and the golfer will ultimately be acquiring not only a poor swing motion but also a weak swing motion. Weak swings are caused from strong grips whereas strong swings develop from neutral, balanced grips. That's what Nicklaus says! Therefore, if you want to plug into all your body energy and transfer that energy to the clubhead, you must first stop interfering with a poor grip. Find neutral!

What is a neutral grip? Although there are many words and pictures

available to explain this, there isn't any guarantee that you will understand, see, and do "neutral" right away. Therefore my explanation is none other than simple. After all, if you want a simple, no frills golf swing, you must start with a simple, no frills grip.

As shown in photograph #1, a balanced grip will have the shaft or grip directly underneath the hand formation. If you are right-handed, the back of the left hand faces the target (pin) which enables you to contact the ball with your clubface square or 90 degrees to the target. The right hand opposes the left.

Photograph #2 shows the most common incorrect grip where the shaft, or grip of the club, is to the left side of the golfer's formation with the back of the left hand facing the sky! You'll see the right hand wrapped too far under the Even



though this grip feels "strong," remember what Nicklaus says, "Strong grips are the cause of weak swings!"

There's no glamour to it! The "neutral" grip that is. You may see it accomplishing nothing active, nothing decisive. On the other hand, there is some kind of beauty in the way fine players place their hands on the club. They all understand that, far from being a static, "still life" sort of thing, the grip is the HEARTBEAT of the golf swing's motion.
