Councillor fans flames of discontent

Sparks were flying at Regional Council Wednesday afternoon after Oakville rep John Graham accused the Region of buckling under to "pressures" for development in Halton Hills.

-"There is a great deal of money being poured in by developers on the assumption that there is an adequate water supply," Graham said. "I can't figure where the pressure is he added. coming from. There seems to be an (Region) staff to find water - who's putting pressure on them?"

In an interview, Graham said he wants answers to the cost of all studies into water and sewage capacities, where the money has come from, and if "developers who contributed funds have any expectations for growth — are they putting pressure on those (councillors) from the north?"

"I seemed to have touched a hot button that I didn't know was hot,"

Graham backed away from a almost desperation on the part of suggestion that, through innuendo, he is claiming the Region is "in the back pocket of developers."

Instead, he qualified his remarks by saying he "is merely seeking answers to his questions."

"There is a sense of urgency (for growth) that I don't understand," he added. "The life of this Regional Council is coming to an end, and I expect people may want to see things completed before it's over...I will either find something that isn't right, or I will be assured everything is okay."

Regional chairman Pete Pomeroy told The Weekend he has "no idea where Councillor Graham is coming from," adding he doesn't

"deal in innuendo."

"I don't understand a lot of it let's put it on the table and we can discuss it," he added. "I'm surprised when a member of council doesn't understand the planning process — it doesn't speak well for the way we train our councillors."

"I've heard some innuendo that developers have a stake in Halton Hills' (decisions) on growth, and it's my understanding that the innuendo is coming from Councillor Graham...I'm used to dealing with

New poundskeeper

Coe Slade of Hornby has been appointed by Town Council as the municipality's new poundskeeper. His duties include impounding all domesticated animals such as cattle, horses, goats and sheep if they are found running at large. Slade is also the poundskeeper of both Milton and Oakville.

He will be paid \$300 annually, \$100/day compensation for food/water/shelter for the animal, and \$40 plus 32.1 cents per kilometre — the last two of which is paid by the owner of the animal. The position became vacant after the former poundskeeper, Elmer Nicholson, passed away earlier this
