# Take the summer fuel safety quiz

This time of year, many people are readying the propane barbecue, gassing up a chain saw to cut wood at the cottage or planning home renovation projects. To help them handle summer chores safely, the Fuels Safety Branch at Ontario's Consumer Ministry has put together the following quiz.

Safety wizards may answer all 10 questions correctly, quick as a flash. Those who find they're burning a lot of energy but not seeing much light might want to get in touch with the ministry's Consumer Information Centre -- the address and phone numbers are given at the end of the quiz -- to get more information on fuel safety. However well you do, the branch hopes you'll find the quiz a fun way to review fuels safety basics.

Answer true or false to these questions:

- To keep gasoline from sloshing around when it's being transported, fill the container right up to the top.

- Safety-conscious backyard chefs never light a gas or propane barbecue with the lid down.

- To make sure there are no leaks in the hose of your gas or propane barbecue, remove it and look for cracks.

Answers:

- False. Gasoline expands when warmed, so filling a container right to the top can result in spillage. Watch the meter on the gas pump and stop filling when the rated capacity of the container is reached.
- True. Gas that doesn't ignite right away can accumulate inside the barbecue and cause an explosion.
- False. There are better ways to make sure gas barbecues are safe. It's best to use a mixture of dish-washing liquid and water.  
(a) Check that burner ports and other openings and gas passages haven't become clogged by rust, dirt or insects over the winter.  
(b) Connect the fuel supply to the barbecue.  
(c) Now it's time for the soapy-water concoction. Mix it about the same strength as for washing dishes. Turn the cylinder valve on. Then brush the solution over all the connections and the hose.  
(d) If bubbles form, you have a leak. Close the cylinder valve, tighten all the connections and try the test again. If repairs are needed call in a service person certified by the Fuels Safety Branch.
- True. Propane has no natural odor. But, an artificial "rotten cabbage" smell is added. If the odor is present, don't use anything that could produce a spark, and shut off the fuel cylinder valve

immediately. Then air out the area. Warn people away until every trace of the odor is gone and the leak is fixed. Natural gas also has its own distinct artificial odor.

Propane is heavier than air, and pockets of the gas may continue to sit in lower areas -- such as a boat bilge -- for some time. A "small" propane explosion can destroy a home, boat or cottage.

5. False. Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas that can kill if it's released in an enclosed space, such as a tent or cottage. Dangerous amounts of carbon monoxide can be produced when any fuel-burning appliances doesn't work properly or is used in a confined area.

6. False. Always store propane cylinders outdoors, away from sunlight and out of the reach of children.

7. True. Indoor-venting propane refrigerators are so dangerous Ontario's Consumer Ministry has banned their sale in the province. Newer models vent to the outdoors. If you own an indoor-venting model, move it outside to a shed or replace it.

8. False. Underground-gas-line locations are provided free of charge by utility companies. You and your contractor should know the exact location of natural-gas lines before you dig. If you're not quite sure where they're positioned, call your local gas supplier.

9. False. Gasoline can be carried safely only in containers approved by the CSA (Canadian Standards Association) or the ULC (Underwriters' Laboratories of Canada).

10. True. Never use a propane barbecue indoors, closer than three feet from a window, combustible wall or any other potentially flammable surface or under a building.

How did you make out on the quiz? If you didn't do well, the Consumer Information Centre can help.
