





Services expected to resume at St. John's in September despite major reconstruction

St. John's United Church Georgetown is a skeleton of its former self, at least for the pre-

Passersby on Guelph Street will notice that a front entryway has been dismantled, an entire rear wall is gone, and most of the east wing has been gutted. Only the sanctuary and the rooms beneath it remain intact.

It's all part of a major renovation and addition that should be completed this fall.

"Everything seems to be on course," says construction supervisor Bryan Upjohn. There have been a few setbacks and surprises dismantling a building that is over 100 years old in some parts, but he still expects that the Nursery School which rents some upstairs rooms will be able to open by mid September.

During construction, the church offices are at the United Church in Glen Williams. It was exactly 20 years ago this summer that the two churches joined together to form one congregation, St. John's United of Georgetown and Glen Williams, with one Board, one budget, and the same minister.

Church services at St. John's Georgetown will resume in September. During the summer, members of St. John's Georgetown have been worshipping with the congregation of Knox Presbyterian Church. Rev. Peter Barrow conducted services in July, and St. John's minister Nancy Knox will be preaching in

Building contractor Wayne Buchanan of Kincardine has hired several local tradespeople and students for the construction. AVR Excavation prepared the ground for the pouring of foundations and floors, which are now complete.

Burghgraef Construction will be doing exterior stucco work, and Manley Densmore has the painting contract. Boehmers is supplying lumber for the project.

At present, plumbing for a new kitchen has been roughed in, the elevator pit is ready, and framing of new walls is begin-When the building is finished,

the church will be fully wheelchair accessible at all levels, and will have new ground floor offices and a new kitchen.

A special feature will be a twostorey gathering area at the back of the church's present apse. From the ground floor, visitors will be able to look up at Gothic style windows which until now have been on the outside of the building. With back lighting, they will be an attractive part of the new addition.

"We get lots of people driving through the parking lot to take a look," says Bryan Upjohn. "Often I come here to find an audience, people just sitting and watching what we're doing."

He is confident that everything will be ready for the official opening weekend, October 19 and 20. "Everything is coming along fine. No problems."
