# Halton crime stats soar 11 per cent

rise in Halton.

That's the news police commissioners heard from Halton Regional Police Service Deputy Chief John Barratt last week. He tabled a report indicating reported crime is up 11.3 per cent in the first six months of 1991, compared with the same period last

"It's obvious it's up quite a bit. Is there anything we should be

concerned about?" asked police commissioner Fred Oliver. "We're concerned over all of it, but is there anything in specific?"

Deputy Chief Barratt said, "analysis is being conducted" by the police to determine whether more crime prevention measures might be warranted and how they should be implemented."

Increases have been reported in shoplifting, assaults, break and enters, vehicle and bicycle thefts and property damage. The high-

est increase was 35 per cent, in shoplifting. Next came a 26 per cent hike in thefts from vehicles and a jump of 24 per cent in vehicle stealing.

The various crime prevention committees and community consulting groups around Halton will also be brought up to speed on the statistics, as will police district commanders, Deputy Chief Barratt said, in an effort to curb criminal activity.

Police commission chairperson


Karen Thompson asked about the rise in assaults and was told part of the reason for the jump was an increase in fights among young men in and around bars.

Police statistics also reveal that calls for service have decreased slightly and that there's been a decrease in vehicle collisions down 471 or 13 per cent.

Fatalities in Halton vehicle mishaps are down from 10 last year to six so far in 1991. "One offences."

### Govt. goof leaves Acton couple red

Someone at Revenue Canada goofed. William Stout and Pauline James of Acton don't want to pay the price for the mistake which a federal government employee made.

A computer operater punched the wrong numbers from the Acton couple's income tax return into the computer. Now Revenue Canada thinks Stout made \$204,000 last year and decided to stop sending Stout and James, who are on permanent disability, a GST rebate. Originally, Stout was told the keyboard operator had punched in earnings of \$2.7 million, but Thursday, a Revenue official told Stout the figure was actually \$204,000.

"I wish I had that \$2.7 million. I could live on the interest alone," Stout said.

The July GST cheque for \$170 didn's arrive, and Stout has made numerous calls to Revenue Canada's Tax Information Phone Service, but only received a busy signal. He got through on a different long-distance line, and was told he would have to wait until October for his cheque.

But Stout said he needs the money now. The couple and their three children just moved in July, which means they had additional expenses.

"We were counting on that cheque to get us through the month," Stout said. They've already dipped into their food money to pay their rent, James said. The couple have a hard enough time keeping bill collectors at bay without additional problems from the federal government, she said.
