Posture - The Link Between Stance and Grip!

Grip and stance are two very important components of the

starting position in golf - components that I've dis-

cussed in the past two weeks. Now it's time to discuss posture. A player's posture is the framework of your swing. It will affect extension, arc, the plane of your swing and most important of all...balance.

Demonstrated in the first photo, the proper posture has balance, is angular, has room to swing and is relaxed. The chin is up (thinking

tall), the shoulders are down and relaxed, the bend is from the hips and the knees are slightly flexed. Notice that

the body's weight should be evenly distributed between your heels and toes. Many times, I will suggest to students that they feel the ground with their feet! Finally, pay

close attention to your arms and hands. Are they suspended directly below your shoulders? You do not want your hands to be either

inside or outside your shoulder line. The correct arm extension, "at address", is very important in hitting a "solid" ball.


The second photograph shows the most common misinterpreta-

tion of posture that I see all too often. The shoulders are high and the hands are outside the shoulder line. Beware golfers! You may be setting yourself in this posture to accommodates club that are not fitted to you. This is especially true when referring to length and lie.

Now is a good time to discover whether your clubs are fitted properly

Correct Stance because posture as show in the second photo will be the cause of numerous compensating movements throughout your swing.

> As a reminder your posture is your own link between stance and grip. All three are important components of the starting position. You, like many other golfers, may fail to realize that faulty posture will greatly affect your ability to contact the ball solidly thus affecting the success of your entire swing.



Tip of the Day! When playing fairways that have been soaked with water..."think tall" and shorten up on the club so that you don't hit the ball fat!

Halton 4-H team judged best

When judges judged the best judges, Ron Bird and Scott Bennet rose like cream to the top of the milk pail and earned the Ontario championship title in the 4-H dairy judging contest.

The event at Kempville, Ontario last week saw 39 teams from across the province eyeing up a variety of cattle breeds in nine judging classes. Halton team coach Bert Stewart said his team's score was 35 points higher than the tough Lanark County entry that took second.

This was the second consecutive year that Ron Bird of Georgetown took home the top team award as a Halton representative. As an individual, he was ranked fourth in overall points scored.

Scott Bennet of Burlington won four prizes including the best team effort and scored the second highest overall point total. He also earned the highest points in the Holstein judging and was second in the section of the event that calls for six sets of reasons for selecting the top cattle entry.

As one of the top four contestants, Scott won a trip to the World Dairy Expo at Madison,

Wisconsin, the first week of October. In this national judging competition, Canadians are not allowed to take home prizes but can compete for points. Stewart will go as his coach.

Ontario 4-H members are only entitled to one international trip in their club careers and as Ron Bird went last year, he'll sit this one out even though he was fourth in the province.


