Area residents to get input into future developments

Halton is gearing itself to be the first municipality in Ontario to involve the public at the beginning stages of all future development proposals, Regional councillors were told Wednesday.

Consultants from the firm Hemson Consortium presented council with their draft of the second phase for the Halton Urban Structure Review (HUSR), a plan for new urban growth outside of existing urban centres.

The bulk of future development of this kind will centre on Halton Hills south, near Hornby, and parts of Milton, according to the first phase of HUSR, completed in 1989.

While reviewing HUSR, consultant Ray Simpson noted the most significant change for Halton to make is to increase public consultation before significant decisions are made on development.

"We've heard a lot of criticism of the current process, where it is more informative rather than consultinvolving the public, and that we that the ministry will approve the

"Now, we are considering all decisions to be made under the environmental assessment type of analysis, where we will be involving the public at each point before decisions are made...Nobody's done it this way before—it is the first attempt of this kind in the province...We're confident this kind of approach is going to work."

Planning commissioner Rash Mohammed noted the Region has learned "from the Georgetown experience," where development proposals for the Silver Creek Valley were constantly altered due to residents' concerns.

"This is exactly what we are trying to avoid - going back and redoing everything once decisions have already been made," Mohammed said. "This is going to save us time, too - we'll know what to do right up front. We can re-cost before we do all the work."

"Is the Province really on our side? Don't you think they are going to say we did it the wrong way, after we spend all this time and money?" Halton Hills rep Marilyn Serjeantson said.

Mohammed assured them that "the Province has said it's going to use Halton as a model — that's why they gave us the money."

Halton chairman Pete Pomeroy applauded the new direction, believing "if we don't try something new, nothing will ever be approved again in Ontario.

"With the Georgetown experience — we thought we covered all of the public's concerns, we consulted the public and then they came back with more questions," he added. "It's all changed now - the public has a lot more to say, and in my opinion this is worth a try. But, critical to this is the support we have to get from the Province... If we don't get it, then let's abandon this and revisit it another day."

Simpson added public meetings will be held on the HUSR in October, and newletters will be sent to every home in the Region.
