Intricately bizarre and filled with unthinkable nuances, "Barton FInk" could only have been dreamed up by the Coen brothers, who also wrote, directed and pro-

duced "Miller's Crossing", "Blood Simple" and "Raising Arizona." So rare is it to experience such invigorating direction in movies these days. The attention paid to detail in "Barton Fink" is amazing and absolutely mesmerizing, both in it's visual design as well as sound. It almost overshadows the actors themselves, but ultimately


And what great performances they are! Every actor in this film is superb, from Turturro and Goodman to the supporting players of Michael Lerner as the studio boss, Jon Polito as his assistant and Tony Shalhoub as the sleazy producer. Even the bit parts, including the hotel's bellhop (Steve Buscemi), are hilarious snippets

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


Students will learn to warp a loom and weave plain, twill and lace weaves.
