
Brooks said he is particularly concerned about the senior citizens in the neighborhood who are "perceived by these thugs as easy targets."

in summer training

Two thousand part-time soldiers of the Army Reserve in Ontario - the Militia - were recently in the field for two weeks of combat training. They're being supported by nearly a thousand soldiers from units of the Special Service Force, the Canadian Army's quick-reaction brigade based at Petawawa, Ontario. Called Central Area Concentration 91, the exercise began August 9 and ran until August 25.

Military training areas at Petawawa and Meaford were being used throughout the exer-

cise. Armored units concentrated in Meaford, where their training is being supported and conducted by the Royal Canadian Dragoons. Infantry, artillery, engineer and combat service support units were in Petawawa with the help of the Canadian Airborne Regiment, 2 Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, 1 Battalion of the Royal Canadian Regiment, 2 Combat Engineer Regiment, 2 Service Battalion, Special Service Force Headquarters and Signals Squadron, 2 Field Ambulance, 2 Military Police Platoon, and the 427 Tactical Helicopter Squadron. Senior commanders from across Ontario were in North Bay for a week of professional development in strategy, tactics and leadership.

Regular and Reserve units were training together to create what the Army calls Total Force, integrated units able to expand or adapt to meet Peacekeeping, Internal Security or Disaster Relief tasks as they arise. Integrated training is cost-efficient because material and human resources, both Regular and Reserve, are consolidated into

one organization. Combat training is the foundation of all military skills, including those used in Peacekeeping, Internal Security and Disaster Relief operations. Armored units in Meaford focused on battle tank tactics and mobile reconnaissance, while the infantry in Petawawa focused on patrols, small attacks and air mobile assaults. Engineers were building bridges and laying minefields while medical platoons practised evacuation and treatment




