However, Councillor Gerald Rennie believed MTO will not heed council's advice, "on the strength of a layman's observation," and suggested they ask for a traffic study.

Councillor Rick Bonnette agreed, but disputed Heaton's charge, arguing he's "travelled that road for three years," and has rarely seen traffic backed up in the area.

"I'll withdraw the recommendation and forget it, and anyone with problems I'll refer them to you," Heaton angrily shot back. "I'll give them Councillor Bonnette's number — even after the election I'll give them your number."

increases every year."

"I want to freeze taxes at the same level for three years ... We've hired so many consultants, wasted all that money and where do they get us? Personally, I would want to hire just one more consultant - - ask him how we can save money, cut taxes, but still have the same services we're accustomed to. Then we will pay him after we read his report."

Pilutti stressed he "strongly favors" preserving much of rural Halton Hills as open space or agricultural. He noted lands south of Hungry Hollow should be reserved for affordable and higher density housing developments, with the lands south of 10 Sdrd. to remain rural.

He suggested industrial areas, currently zoned in Georgetown South, should be moved to the Trafalgar Rd./22 Sdrd. area where the Region's reservoir is being constructed.

Pilutti reasoned it is the centre of the municipality, and the open space at the south end would provide a buffer between Mississauga and the Town.

"We don't want to be a part of Mississauga — we should make it eternally green along there," he added. "We need to put green between one municipality and the other — for distinction. I'm all for protecting the environment as much as possible."

The Town's Official Plan and zoning bylaws need to be updated "in order to provide for good development," and Pilutti noted he will see that it's done.

"That's one of my first goals, to develop a comprehensive zoning bylaw and an updated Official Plan," he said. "We cannot have good development without both things. We're still working with a zoning bylaw that was passed in 1957. And, for the needs of today, that's inadequate."
