Never mind the fact that we value the union-management process when it is our contract being settled but we want the government to intercede in the labor disputes which cause inconvenience in our lives.


Never mind the fact that we don't want to be in the minority - racially or otherwise. We are still quick to criticize the government's struggle to establish justice for all.

If the reporter had read the 70-page report that was given to town councillors on Sept. 20 and also if some of the councillors had read it, then you would not have printed that there was a lack of information.

Included in the report were numerous letters I received concerning trespass, abuse and assault in our area both during the annual Ministry of Natural Resources November hunt and throughout the year. The reporter would have

written the editorial quite differently, if he had taken the time to review the contents of the report.

The problem relating to damage to crops and trees can be solved without an annual hunt. If the deer were classed as predators, then the farmers could shoot them all year round, and the problem would be solved. It is not necessary for outside hunters to be brought in to solve our problems.
