

Youth assaulted

A 18-year-old Acton resident was taken to Georgetown hospital after he was assaulted in front of Georgetown District High School Wednesday morning at 8:45 a.m.

An 18-year-old Limehouse resident was charged with assault level I, police said. The victim was in front of the high school with his girlfriend when the accused allegedly came up behind and punched him in the mouth. After a second punch to the head, the victim fell to the ground and the accused punched him repeatedly, police said. The victim was also kicked in the head and stomach area.

When the vice principal of the school came out to find out what was going on, the accused ran away, but he was later arrested at the school.

The victim had a cracked tooth and bruises on his head. He was treated and released from the hospital.

Stolen pumpkins


Break and enter
