Halton pair is the dairy best

Kelly Stewart and Ron Bird milked the competition for all it was worth at the 1991 Silver Dollar competition at Erin Fairgrounds in August.

Stewart, of Hornby, showed the grand champion in the dairy competition and won the conformation class as well. Bird, of Georgetown, scored the highest points in the quiz and also won the showmanship division.

The pair were members of the Halton 4-H Club team which again captured the top county award in

the dairy competition. Wellington County won the honors in the herdsmanship class.

Competitors came from counties across Ontario including Victoria, Durham West, Dufferin, Peterborough and Bruce.

The annual event is sponsored by United Breeders Inc. of Guelph. The organizers reported the event was a success and a full house witnessed the beef and dairy shows.

Third man charged with sexual abuse

A third man has been charged with sexual abuse in relation to the ongoing investigation at E. C. Drury School for the Deaf in Milton.

A former student told police that between January, 1971 and December, 1972, a teacher repeatedly touched her genitals on several occasions in the teacher's car and at his home. The teacher is a 54 year old man living in Wallenstein, north of Guelph, police said.

The man was called into the Georgetown police station Tuesday and charged with indecent assault. He worked as a teacher and counsellor at the school until 1990. He appeared in Milton Provincial Court for a bail hearing Wednesday, and was released on bail until Oct. 28, when a trial date will be set, police said. The man has been told he must not have any contact with the victim during this time.

Two other teachers at the school were charged with sexual abuse during the investigation with began last spring.

Police believe there was no conspiracy between the three men in carrying out the abuse.

Ammunition stolen

Equipment used to refill bullet casings was stolen from a wooden shed on Ewing St. in Georgetown at the home of a member of a gun club. The door to the shed was forced open early Wednesday morning, police said.

Stolen items include 16 lbs. of gun powder, 650 bullet casings, a loading press (used to refill the bullet casings, which are the most expensive part of the bullets and can be refilled), a scale and gun cleaning kit. Tools stored in the shed, including a chain saw and drill, were also taken. Police said the thieves also pried open the trunk of the victim's car, probably looking for guns, which they didn't find. The man's wife woke up at 1:45 a.m. and turned on the kitchen light, which likely scared the thieves away, police said.

Police beat

TV, Nintendo stolen

A home on Treanor Cr. in Georgetown was entered during the night Wednesday while the family was sleeping upstairs. Stolen items include a TV, Nintendo game, some cash, a water cooler and a briefcase, police said. The thieves entered the house through a door from the garage to the laundry room and then left from a sliding door from the family room.

3 golf carts stolen

Two youths were arrested Tuesday and charged with stealing golf carts on two consecutive nights from North Halton Golf Club. The youths were arrested when they were picked up by police while riding two of the carts along 8th Line, south of 15 Sdrd. on Tuesday night. The youths were 15 and 16 years old. According to police, the previous night the youths took three golf carts, valued at \$4,500 each and abandoned two in a farmer's field near Trafalgar Rd. and 15 Sdrd. The third broke down in Cedarvale Park and was recovered later Monday, police said. The youths are charged with two counts of theft over \$1,000 as well as possession of stolen property.

Fridge, stove stolen

A fridge and a stove, as well as two doors and some lumber were stolen from a building site on Mountainview Rd. and Barber Dr. overnight last Friday, Oct. 11. The house was locked at 10 p.m., with the exception of a laundry room door which couldn't be secured, police said.

Drug theft

Halton police are investigating the theft of an emergency first aid kit from Mohawk Raceway on Guelph Line in Milton on Oct. 13. The kit contained some prescription drugs which, if injected improperly could cause serious illness or death, police said. Several syringes

were also stolen. The drugs included diazepam, lanoxin, epinephrine, dilantin and nitroglycerine and other drugs used in the treatment of heart attack victims. The first aid equipment and drugs were contained in a black attache style case, police said. Anyone finding the case or its contents should contact the Halton Regional Police at 878-5511. Sexual assault

Halton Regional Police have charged a 69 year old Cobourg man with indecent assault and gross indecency. Two sisters told police they were sexually molested on repeated occasions from 1961 to 1973, while they were three to 12 years of age. The incidents occurred when the man was alone with each victim in houses, cars and Spencer Smith Park in Burlington, and also occurred on occasions in Georgetown and Toronto, police said. The abuses involved the man touching the victims' genitals, and forcing them to put their hands on his genitals. The sisters reported the sexual abuses to the Halton Police on June 24, 1991. The man is to appear in Burlington Provincial Court on Nov. 12.

Woman attacked

A Toronto man is in custody awaiting a bail hearing after a 19 year old woman was sexually assaulted in Milton on Sunday, Oct. 13. Halton police said the woman was attacked by the suspect, 20, in his parked car after being with him at a Milton tavern Saturday night. Following the assault, the suspect drove the victim to Milton District Hospital and waited while she was being treated, police said. The victim reported the assault to staff at the hospital and the suspect was arrested there by Halton Regional Police officers.
