Hundreds attend rededication of St. John's

Hundreds of members and friends of St. John's United Church in Georgetown gathered to celebrate the church's 152nd anniversary this month, and to dedicate its new renovation and expansion project, still under construction.

With sunlight streaming through a partially completed apse roof, they marked the heritage of a congregation started by Wesleyan Methodists and a saddlebag preacher in 1839, and of a building constructed on land purchased in 1846 for five shillings.

With many changes and additions since then, the current building project provides new gathering space, offices, an elevator, and a new kitchen, with complete accessibility to all three levels of the building.

A focal point will be the provision of stained glass for windows on the church's former back wall, now to be enclosed by a gallery and music rooms, and visible from a new Heritage Hall one storey below.


Despite the chill of "air conditioning" in the new section, no one seemed to mind standing

among studs and construction materials to dedicate the project. A major cause for delayed completion has been late delivery of steel beams by a recession-bound supplier. One of the surprises of renovating an old building was the discovery that, for many years, there has been very little holding up the choir loft! The steel is now in place.

Contractor Wayne Buchanan of Kincardine, present for the dedication, says roofing can go ahead quickly now, with windows, exterior stucco, and drywall soon to follow. He expects the congregation can begin to use their new space before Christmas, along with many user groups including Cubs, Scouts, Brownies, Alcoholics Anonymous, the Saturday Centre, and the Georgetown Nursery School.

"As we stand together to rededicate this building, it is not finished," said Drew Leverette, who chaired the congregation's building committee. "This is perhaps symbolic, because our commitment to each other is never finished."

A highlight of the weekend was the return of Dr. Hal

Llewellyn, minister of St. John's during the 1970s, and now with the United Church's head office in Ioronto.

Preaching from a passage in II Kings, in which Jerusalem negotiates at its walls with Assyrian

invaders, he said, "As we stand behind these walls between us and the world, we publicly declare our special identity, an alternative vision of how we should live, a promise to work for human dignity and justice."

"We declare that the needs of the poor have priority over the needs of the rich, the needs of the marginalized have priority over orders that seek to exclude them. We challenge systems and structures. Only then are our new walls more than bricks and mor-

In her message, the Rev. Nancy Knox noted the tremendous vision, dedication, and hours of labor offered for the building project by so many people. She invoked the names of past members going back many years, who now form a "cloud of witnesses" around the project.

From its beginning, the renovation and restoration has symbolized."care and respect for our heritage, the vitality of a welcoming congregation, and the desire of St. John's to include all in an enhanced level of fellowship."

The congregation continues to plan fundraising events for its project, including a December 7 House Tour of six Georgetown

homes decorated for Christmas, a Variety Night, a Golf Tournament in the spring, and a fund in memory of former Music Director Ken Harrison, who inspired many of Georgetown's present musical tal-

A special "Let There Be Light" campaign invites donations for new windows and stained glass in the dramatically restored church apse. "Through the use of glass and natural light," says Drew Leverette, "we symbolize the vitality and warmth of this welcoming congregation."




