





Unemployed can get trade training here

People on unemployment benefits in Halton Hills who have been wondering whether they should go into a trade can use a new training program to help them decide.

For the first time the Halton Board of Education and the Canada Employment Centre have been working jointly to put together the program, called Trades Exploration which will run for 21 weeks, ending May 15. It begins Monday, Dec. 2 and will allow people to gain work experience and instruction while they are on unemployment benefits.

"We're really excited about it because a lot of people know there is a future in the trades, and this will enable them to decide if they want to go into it," Debby McIntyre, the manager of the Georgetown Canada Employment Centre said in an interview Tuesday. There has been a shortage of skilled trades people over the last several years and this is projected to continue into the future.

The program will allow students explore three areas: machinist/tool and die, industrial electrician, and fitter welder.

"It's a take-off on the Into program, an introducation to trades for women. We had nothing like that for men and now this is open to people of both sexes," McIntyre

The program includes instruction in auto CAD (computer-aided design) for all three trades.

"If you don't have the computerized end of trades, you're not marketable anymore," McIntyre said.

Anyone who is on unemployment benefits and is operating at a Grade 10 level is eligible for the program. Grant points out that selection will be based on a personal interview, and actual Grade 10 credits aren't as important as ability. There are 21 places in the program.

The program is funded by money from unemployment insurance premiums, which is why it is only open to those receiving this money, McIntyre said.

There are about 2,100 people in Halton Hills currently on UI benefits, McIntyre said.

At the end of the program, people will be able to chose a new career path: they may become apprentices or take a college program so they can become qualified in the area they chose.
