School's volleyball teams claim Provincial crowns

Double gold for Centennial athletes


The Centennial Chargers boys and girls volleyball teams travelled to Durham County last weekend to compete in the Provincial Cup volleyball tournament.

The Provincial Cup tournament, which began 12 years ago in Barrie, is the largest elementary volleyball tournament in Canada, with a total of 96 teams and more than 1,000 athletes from around the province competing in the two-day competition.

Centennial teams have competed in every Provincial Cup tournament since 1980 and have enjoyed a great deal of success over the years. In 1988, the boys' squad were crowned champions and the girls' team took the bronze. In 1989, the girls again came close and finished fourth in the province.

But Saturday evening, with the support of parents and teachers, the two Centennial teams were able to match a feat accomplished only once before, the rare double gold victory!

In the girls' competition, coaches Jim Atkinson and Brian Cosgrove took their lady Chargers to Oshawa with reserved optimism. Although their team had won two tournaments and were 7-1 in league play, they had struggled in two matches held earlier in the week. However, things began to look promising as they finished pool

play Saturday with a 10-0 record and only 31 points scored against them.

In the playoff elimination the Chargers disposed of Tecumseh of Burlington 15-1, 15-5 and Pringle Creek of Oshawa 15-7, 15-4.

To reach the final four the Chargers had to defeat arch rival Glashan of Ottawa, who have been stumbling block for Charger teams at this tournament in the past. Glashan proved no match for this Centennial squad as the girls destroyed the Ottawa school 15-3, 15-3.

Saturday evening at Pickering High School the girls were matched up with Buchanan of Scarborough in the semi-final. The Buchanan girls were a well coached team with excellent skills and powerful, accurate serves. The Chargers dropped behind quickly in the first game 5-0 as they had difficulty receiving the serve.
