Angela, 13 years old and Canada's second-ranked junior, showed the big girls a thing or two by finishing second in the finals — ahead of some of the top senior talent from across Canada, the U.S. and Great Britain.

Coach Barb Fraser was clearly delighted with the outcome, pointing out that Angela outperformed Stella Umeh, Canada's second-ranked senior and a member of Canada's world team last season.

Katie, 10, wasn't going to let Angela have all the glory: she won the junior meet.

Fraser noted that Katie's national ranking jumped from 12th, in her pre-novice days when she first signed on with her, to sixth as a junior.

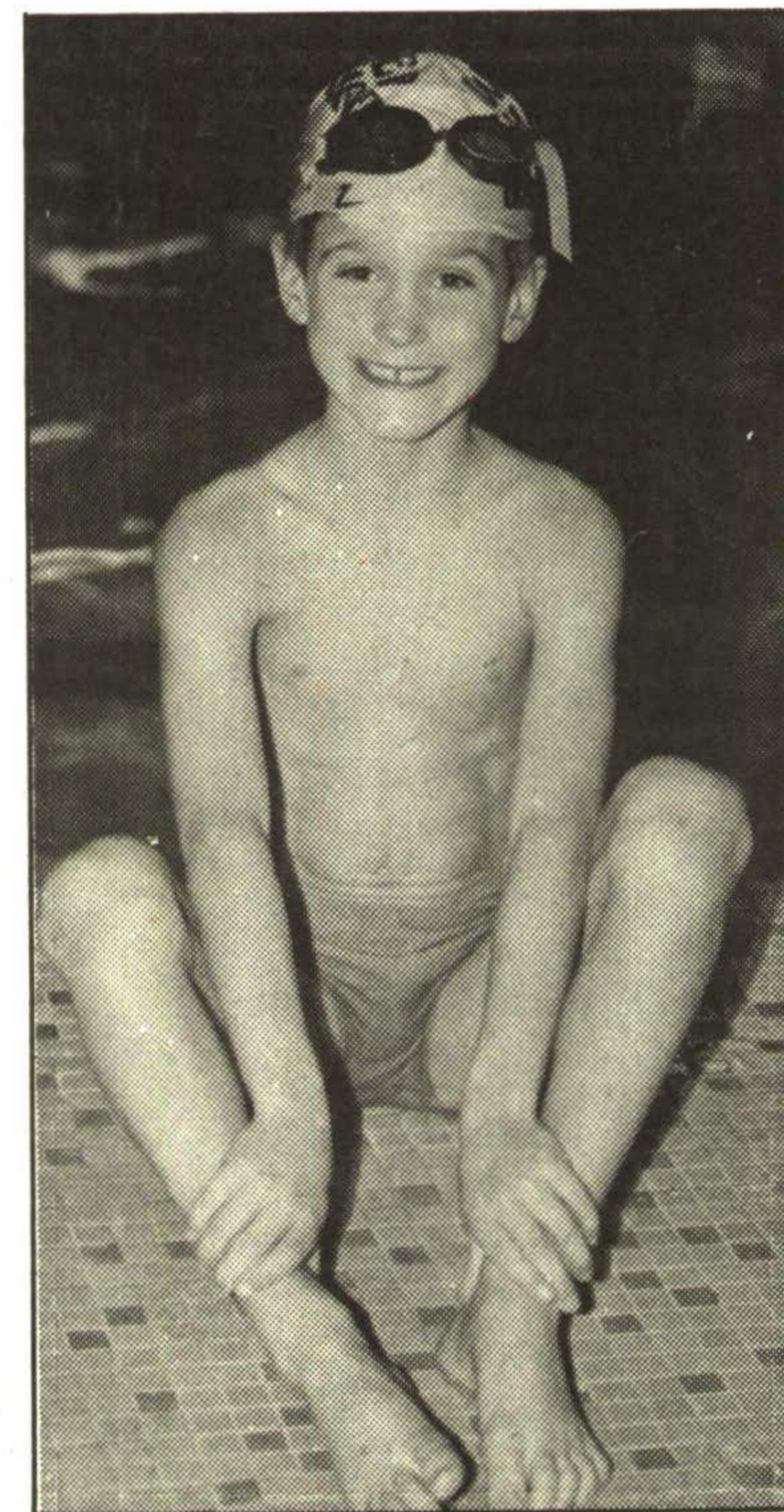
At the Wingym International Invitational in Montreal last week, Katie was second in floor routine with 9.5, third in bars with 9.2, sixth in vault with 8.85 and seventh in beam with 8.5.

Angela won her flight, finishing first all-round over 35 other competitors, and was 12th in the combined competition, which had 70 participants. She ended up with a 36.65 all-round total, and, tied for sixth, gained entry to the finals at #8. In the finals, she achieved a very impressive 9.6 to earn second place.

Next up for the girls is next month's Meet Canada, also in Montreal, where selections will be made for high-performance competition.
