CREATE SOMETHING **UNIQUE FROM** ORDINARY HOUSEPLANTS

A few creative touches can turn ordinary houseplants into something extraordinary. It doesn't require any special powers, jut a few tools and accessories and a dose of patience.

Here is a few ideas to get you going, but don't stop here, let your imagination loose and create your own masterpiece,

*Train long, trailing stems of hanging houseplants around a ring that is secured into soil. Once the stems grow and fill out on the ring it grows into a living wreath. This works well with ivy plants, Hoyas and Stephanotis.

*A similar technique to allow a trailing plant to grow up a cork or bark pole inserted upright into a pot of soil. Plants that develop aerial roots (roots that grow out of the stem) are particularly suited to this because they will anchor into the pole. This creates a slender, upright piece of greenery. Aerial roots readily develop on Pothos and numerous varieties of Philodendrons.

*A thin, fan-shaped piece can be made by weaving trailing stems through a short trellis. Ivies are well suited to this treatment.

*Topiary-like plants can be created from indoor plants too. Removing the bottom branches and/or leaves and then pruning the remaining head into a ball or other shape produces a formal topiary effect. As the head grows it will have to be occasionally pruned back into shape. Tall houseplants such as Weeping Fig, Covette, Citrus and Hibiscus work particularly well for topiary.

GREEN THUMB Swans safe and sound for the winter

Fairy Lake's most admired feathered inhabitants, the swans, have finally found their winter home, thanks again to the efforts of the Town's Recreation and Parks Department.

Parks superintendent Bryan Shynal explained to the Independent/Free Press that every year the swans are moved from their regular hangout on the lake's east end to the west end, where the water is kept free of ice.

However, the move this winter had been delayed until Tuesday because Town staff had to wait until the lake was sufficiently frozen in order

for them to walk on it to collect the

"We get a lot of calls about this every year, when people see the swans still at the east end of the lake," Shynal said. "But we monitor the condition of the ice daily to make sure it is safe enough to walk on. Then our staff can go out and corral the swans and move them to the open water at the other end...We weren't able to do that until Tuesday."

The water is kept open by an aerator supplied by Smallwood Acres trailer camp which borders the west end of the lake, he added.

VIP status at the library

The Acton and Georgetown public borrower. libraries are offering VIP status to discriminating patrons.

"VIP status" to library users means "video insurance paid," and signing up for this optional, annual insurance program will provide coverage against charges for physical damage to the videotapes you borrow.

Clarice Isabel Dolson died at St. Joseph's Hospital in Guelph Nov. 6 at the age of 86.


