A one-hour television special focussing on Limehouse resident Ross Carlin's odyssey to record a new version of O' Canada will air tonight, March 1 at 7 p.m. on Channels 9 and 13 in Halton Hills.

Carlin is the Orangeville disc jockey who couldn't obtain a copy of the national anthem last year during the Gulf War. He decided to have three new versions of O'Canada recorded and distributed

to 14,400 schools across the country.

Two all-star symphonic versions and a contemporary rendition featuring 240 of Canada's top recording artists were recorded. Singers included Murray McLaughlin, Rita MacNeil, Gino Vanelli, Tommy Hunter, Maestro Fresh Wes and Alannah Myles.

Halton-Peel MP Garth Turner helped drum up corporate sponsors for the project.

Georgetown Globe Productions is proud to announce the duties of director for the next production, Rodgers and Hammerstein's South Pacific will be assumed by the very capable Vesta Jorgensen.

Vesta came to Georgetown from a small community outside Montreal in 1989 and brought with her a wide range of performance and directing experience. She had worked with a number of directors, both professional and amateur, before launching her solo effort with Georgetown Globe Production's "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum," which was performed to sold-out crowds here last year.

Vesta has a very clear concept of the "South Pacific" show she would like to see performed and her job is now to ensure that her ideas make it to the stage by opening night.

This is accomplished by choosing a "balanced cast of actors" who "understand character and function" and then overcoming the myriad of problems which haunt all musicals. Vesta has some innovative ideas in mind and deliberately shunned the move "to avoid reproducing the good or bad...I'm forced to find solutions to problems, not have them handed to me."

For Vesta, the most challenging aspect of her directorial duties will be in the moving of large groups of

CVCA turns its focus to trees in 1992

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority plans on paying closer attention to the trees in its watershed in 1992, they decided at their annual meeting Jan. 16.

"Throughout 1991, the Authority adopted water quality as an issue to which particular attention was paid," says Land Resources manager Ken Owen. "While the water quality issue is still being

pursued in 1992, the Authority will focus its attention on trees and their benefits to the watershed ecosystem, including water quality."

"Public awareness is increasing with respect to the function of trees and staff is experiencing more requests for assistance to undertake tree planting events by both public groups and private companies," says Owen. "By adopting trees as

our focus we hope to build on the increased public awareness."

The Conservation Authority, however, has had for many years an active reforestation program involving both public and private landowners. Close to 300,000 trees were planted in 1991 alone.

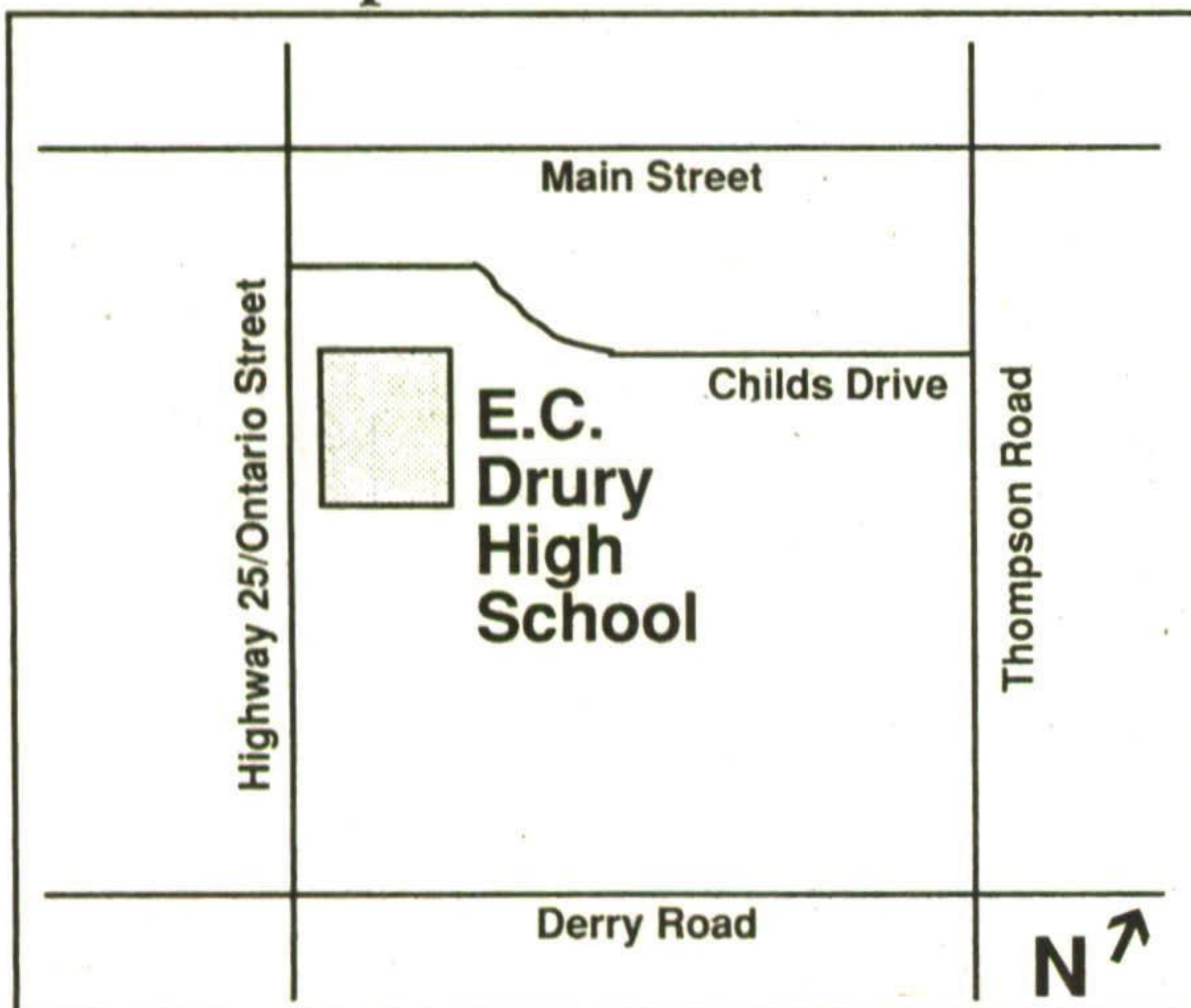
Throughout 1992, the Authority will focus on specific tree, forest and vegetation related issues.
