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Natural Resources (MNR) will be approving UAL's updated rehabilitation plans within two weeks after which, the town will not be able to comment on the Third Line, he said.

However, councillors argued at the time, and again on Friday, that the Third Line issue is a part of their overall strategy, but they do not believe it that is the ultimate solution to stopping the proposed dump. However, they fell short of explaining their reasoning, arguing that it would not be prudent to give their legal strategies away.

That seemed to annoy the four residents who attended Friday's meeting to convince councillors of the merits of Landry's suggestion.

Pat Woode, representing EAGLE, FOAD's Fraser Robin, POWER's Rob Barlow and Acton resident Jean Hillborn all argued for council to take immediate action, as well as to publicize what steps it is taking to let the general public know what its elected representatives are doing.

"I understand your frustration that we can't talk," councillor Gail Rutherford told the group. "But, I must make you aware that shortly after becoming a councillor, we were all brought up to speed on the dump, and what has happened. The evidence proved to me that council is very active in trying to fight it. I just wanted to clarify people's misconceptions about that. It is a priority for council, and a lot of work has

gone into this thing. It's just too bad that we can't let your groups in on everything."

After repeated questioning from councillors, Woode admitted that they are basing their arguments on advice received from the Canadian Law Association, and not from a retained lawyer. She added, however, that all of their information has been shared with Halton Region's solicitor.

But, Barlow argued that many citizens do not have the same resources as Halton Hills, adding that they are all searching for the keys that will unlock the solution to their problem.

Councillor Rob Heaton suggested that citizen groups such as FOAD and POWER could join council in private talks, since they are all working towards the same goal, but D'Agostino was not supportive of the idea.

"Trust in litigation is like marriage - when it works it's beautiful, but if not, it can get pretty ugly," he said. "Make sure you know where you are placing your trust...I thought the last meeting we had was a confidential meeting, but now I see this letter that's supposed to be based on those discussions....I'm just afraid of history repeating

After two and a half hours of debate, and another 30 minutes behind closed doors, councillors agreed to "reconfirm" their request to the MNR for council to review UAL's updated site plans before they receive final approval.



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
