Armstrong earns national award

Georgetown insurance broker Paul Armstrong is the 1991 winner of the Jean Robitaille Community Service Award.

Created in 1988 to honor former Insurance Bureau of Canada Chairman and Royal Insurance Canada President Jean Robitaille, the award is presented each year to an individual in the Canadian property/casualty insurance industry who has best demonstrated a record of outstanding humanitarian service and dedication to individuals, groups and the community as a whole. The award comprises a modern sculpture, plus a \$1,000.00 cash award donated by Royal Insurance Canada to the charity of the recipient's choice.

Armstrong has an impressive record of community service. He has served as Chairman of Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital Board; Chairman of Region 5 of the Ontario Hospital Association; Master of Credit Lodge Masonic Order; Fundraising Chairman and President of the Cancer Society, Georgetown Unit; Secretary and Sponsor of the Georgetown Agricultural Society; Past President of Georgetown Rotary Club and

District Governor's Representative in the Region; MC at Rotary's Seniors' Dinner; Active member for Holcro, a group for the construction of a Seniors' Residence; sponsor of local sporting and cultural events; lecturer at Driver Education courses, long-standing member of St. George's Anglican Church and President of Halton Hills Insurance Brokers Association.

Any person active in the property/casualty industry as a company employee, insurance broker, adjuster, or association employee is eligible to receive the award. All nominees are reviewed and appraised by a panel of judges drawn from the industry.

Last year the award was won by John B. (Jack) Throp, a senior account executive in the L.G. Trask Agency Ltd. in Yarmouth, Nova Scotia.

The 1991 Jean Robitaille Community Service Award was presented to Armstrong on Feb. 19 of this year at the annual dinner of the Insurance Institute of Ontario by I.I.O President Judy Maddocks, F.I.I.C. and Michael C. Barnard, Executive Vice President, Royal Insurance Company of Canada.

Trafficking charges

Two Georgetown men and five people from Milton have been charged with possession of narcotics for the purpose of trafficking.

About \$3,000-worth of narcotics was seized Tuesday, including vials of hash oil, bags of marijuana and small quantities of hashish. In addition, \$1,500 cash was seized.

The Halton Regional Police Drug Squad and the OPP Drug Enforcement Unit began investigating the drug conspiracy last month. On Tuesday four search warrants were executed simultaneously at four locations, including one at a Georgetown residence.

Two Georgetown men, aged 30 and 26, shared the same residence and both have been charged with possession of narcotics for the purpose of trafficking and possession of a prohibited weapon (a flick knife).

Severe damage

Two cars were severely damaged in an accident on Guelph St. and Maple Ave. Tuesday afternoon. An Acton man was attempting to turn his 1981 Chevrolet left on Maple Ave., when he collided with a 1984 Chevrolet which was westbound. The driver of the 1981 Chev was charged with making an unsafe turn.

Fail to yield

A Georgetown driver was charged with failing to yield right of way Tuesday at 8:50 a.m. She was leaving a parking lot, driving her 1991 Honda onto Guelph St., when her car collided with a 1981 Pontiac which was heading east. The Pontiac was moderately damaged, while the Honda was severely damaged.

Stereo stolen

A car stereo was stolen from an unlocked car parked at the Georgetown Go Station Monday. A woman returned to her car to find


