Hillsburgh rallies to family's aid

The Hillsburgh community has come together to help fire victims Josie and Albert Wintersinger and their two children by setting up a fund, collecting donations and planning a benefit dance.

The family lost their house to a fire early March 23. The fire call came at 4 a.m., and firefighters

said the fire was well under way by the time they arrived. It took about 20 firefighters, one pumper and two tankers nearly five hours to put the fire out, Hillsburgh fire chief Fred Cox said. They had to work hard to keep the fire from spreading to a barn and a shed.

"I couldn't even say where the fire started: it's of unknown origin," Cox said. "They were using two wood stoves, some heaters, or it could have been old wiring." No investigation is being done to find out the cause of the fire and arson is not suspected, he said.

The house was a two storey farm house, and the family had spent the winter renovating it. They were just about finished their work, and were about to move back in when it was consumed by fire.

Friend Colleen Hawes said she had lots of phone calls last week offering donations for the family.

"Last week was a clothing glitch and maybe this week will be a furniture glitch," she said. Any donations can be directed to her at 855-6440.

People have been donating money to help the family, but she couldn't say how much has been donated. Money can be deposited into the Wintersinger Fire Fund at the Royal Bank either in Hillsburgh or Erin.

A benefit dance with all proceeds going to the Wintersinger Fire Fund will be held Saturday, April 18, 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. The dance will be at the Hillsburgh Community Centre in the top room and there will be a disc jockey. Tickets are \$10 each. For more information, call Colleen Hawes at 855-6440.

Hawes added the Wintersingers have decided to renovate their barn and move into it temporarily, until they can make arrangements for more permanent housing.

Georgetown businessman killed in air crash Tuesday

Ice on the wings was a contributing factor in a plane crash that killed a Georgetown businessman Tuesday night, according to investigators.

Randy Masters, 27, owner of Georgetown Discount Car and Truck Rentals and his friend and pilot, Mario Aubrey, 34, also killed, were only approximately 15 minutes away from home when their small plane went down in a farmer's field during a snowstorm, 48 km north of London. The pair were returning to the Brampton Flying Club from a one day business trip to Windsor. Masters was visiting the Discount Car and Truck Rental Store he had recently bought there.

Through his business Masters sponsored hockey and baseball teams, helped handicapped children get involved in sports and was always ready to donate to a worthy cause, say his friends and business associates.

The safety board's final report on the crash will not be complete for another few weeks, but investigators have determined that both engines on the airplanes were running when it hit the ground, according to Dave Roher of the Transportation Safety Board. Investigators are certain ice accumulation on the wings of the airplane was a factor in the crash, but it is not known yet if it is the only factor.
