John Dunstall of Hornby has asked the town for permission to start a food trailer business on the corner of Trafalgar Rd. and Steeles Ave. for the summer. Dunstall explained to council that he intends to serve hamburgers, fries, hot dogs, pop and ice cream, so it would not conflict with the neighboring donut shop. He also noted that four to six students will be hired to help run the small business. Councillors seemed to support his application to amend the town's licensing bylaw for the trailer, and asked staff for a report.

> McNally mall almost approved

Dave McNally's bid to build a commercial plaza on Guelph St., next to Neilson's Dairy in Georgetown, is one step away from being approved. McNally's project has been in limbo for three years, while the town stalled in order to complete traffic and marketing studies for the area. Councillors gave it tentative approval two weeks ago, but formally told staff Monday night to draw up the necessary bylaws for final approval on April

Arcade for Georgetown Marketplace?

Councillors asked for a report outlining the legalities of licensing arcades after receiving a request to establish one in the expanded Marketplace. Georgetown Councillor Pam Johnston acknowledged arcades may bring more business to the local shops, but believed it "promotes violence

among young people." Councillors Gail Rutherford and Ron Chatten asked that surrounding schools and the general public be asked to respond to the staff report as well.

Barber Mill redeveloped?

The Esquesing Historical Society, concerned about the fate of the former Barber Paper Mill on River Dr. in Georgetown, recently urged council in a letter to ensure the safety of the aging buildings. It believes that they are "silent reminders of 138 years of Georgetown's paper making history." Mayor Russ Miller told council that he was meeting with "someone" this week interested in buying the site. "I also hate to see it in its state of disrepair," he said. "Hopefully, we'll have a buyer for its redevelopment."

Councillor gets runaround Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson angrily exclaimed that she is

inquires about the possibility of a sidewalk through Hungry Hollow Obviously Mountainview frustrated, she said that both region and town staff keep passing the buck to one another, and she feels that she's not getting any straight

answers. "I want an answer, and I don't care who's responsibility it is," she said. Town engineer Bob Austin assured the councillor that he expects a report on the sidewalk within four to six weeks.

Loan tentatively approved

Councillors approved "in principle" a loan of up to \$4,000 to the Georgetown Horseshoe Club for the installation of lights in the

Fairgrounds above the horseshoe pits. Jim Lahey, on behalf of the club, asked councillors for the money, assuring them that the money will be paid back within three years. The funds will come from the recreation and parks department reserves, and not from general taxes, according to a report.


Apartment units delayed

Albert Euteneier's bid to build two more apartment units in his Wesleyan St. property Georgetown was tentatively rejected by councillors Monday night, who were concerned that there is not enough parking in the area. Euteneier's property presently con-

tains three apartments and a health spa. Deputy planning director Bruce MacLean noted he will "discuss the parking issue with the applicant" and return to council as soon as possible.

Illegal apartments

Following a complaint about an illegal apartment north of Georgetown, councillor Pam Johnston suggested that local realtors be asked to tell prospective buyers if and when an illegal apartment exists, as well as informing them of the town's intention to prosecute. "I know they don't have to do it, but it's incumbent upon us to have leadership in this area," she said.




