Opening of New Halton Skills Training Centre

Sheridan College's Halton Skills Training Centre, a new campus that will replace five other Sheridan campuses, creating a single, major community resource for training, retraining and upgrading in Halton Region, will be open for classes at the beginning of July 1992.

Consolidating all of the programs currently offered through the Perdue, Port Street, Argus Road, Queen Elizabeth and Dorval campuses at one central location, the Halton Skills Centre will deliver programs through the Faculty of Continuing Education, the Faculty of Skills Development and Apprenticeship and the Training and Development Division.

Situated on Iroquois Shore Rd. in Oakville, the 88,000 sq. ft. Centre, on five acres of land will have 26 classrooms, 16 labs, six office spaces, four shops, and 11 auxiliary support areas, and will offer approximately 20% more effective space than was available at the other five campuses combined.

Funding for the Centre comes from consolidating the lease money that would have been spent on the rental of the other five campuses, and has been made possible without the expenditure of any capital dollars.

CRIME PREVENTION MEMO - HOUSE NUMBERS

The Oakville Crime Prevention Committee would like all residents of Oakville to do a little experiment. After dark, turn on your usual outdoor lighting. Then go out to the street and look at your house. Are your house numbers instantly visible? If they are, give yourself a pat on the back and rest assured that an emergency vehicle would be able to find your home easily.

If your house numbers cannot be easily seen, or even worse, you don't have any, think of the consequences. The emergency vehicle (police, fire, ambulance) might take a little longer to find you - the "little longer" could mean someone's life.

For those of you whose homes back onto another street, a park or a ravine, let's take the subject of house numbers one step further. If a police officer were in that park or ravine and needed backup assistance, it would certainly help that officer if he or she could shine a flashlight at the nearest house and be able to report "I am inPark, behind number...."

Help the Halton Police and yourselves - put your house numbers on both the front and the back of your dwelling!
