# Haynes heads up summer programs

The 22 year-old Georgetown native has spent the past three summers with the Rec Department, working as a supervisor, and coordinated the annual carnival, the summer art centre, leadership camps and variety night at John Elliott Theatre.

She will run the carnival again this year, and has hopes of making it "a really big show" this year by incorporating vendors and has invited the Toronto Blue Jays, but hasn't received any confirmation yet.

Dee Dee has also started a baseball camp this year, which is already half full with registrations, and added a second week to the Georgetown tennis camp.

"The Children's Theatre Camp is already booked,"

says Dee Dee, "Before I even started the job. That's quite a change over past years."

The Childrens' Musical Theatre Camp is another popular one again this year, with lots of interest, says Dee Dee. In addition, day campers will be spending time at Kelso Conservation Area.

Dee Dee has also re-organized the Acton Summer Camps to better tailor them to the needs of the Acton community.

The Rec Department will be taking leaders and supervisors to Blue Springs Scout Camp for their training session, June 23-25, with 20 staff leaders, (one less than last year,) and five supervisors.

"We have a number of leaders returning again this year," says Dee Dee, "With 12 returning and eight new ones. And two of last years' leaders have moved up to supervisors, while three returned for another year, so we have a great staff to work with."

Dee Dee is a graduate of Ryerson's Bachelor of Applied Arts in Early Childhood Education (ECE) and holds a diploma in ECE from Mohawk College.

#### Close calls

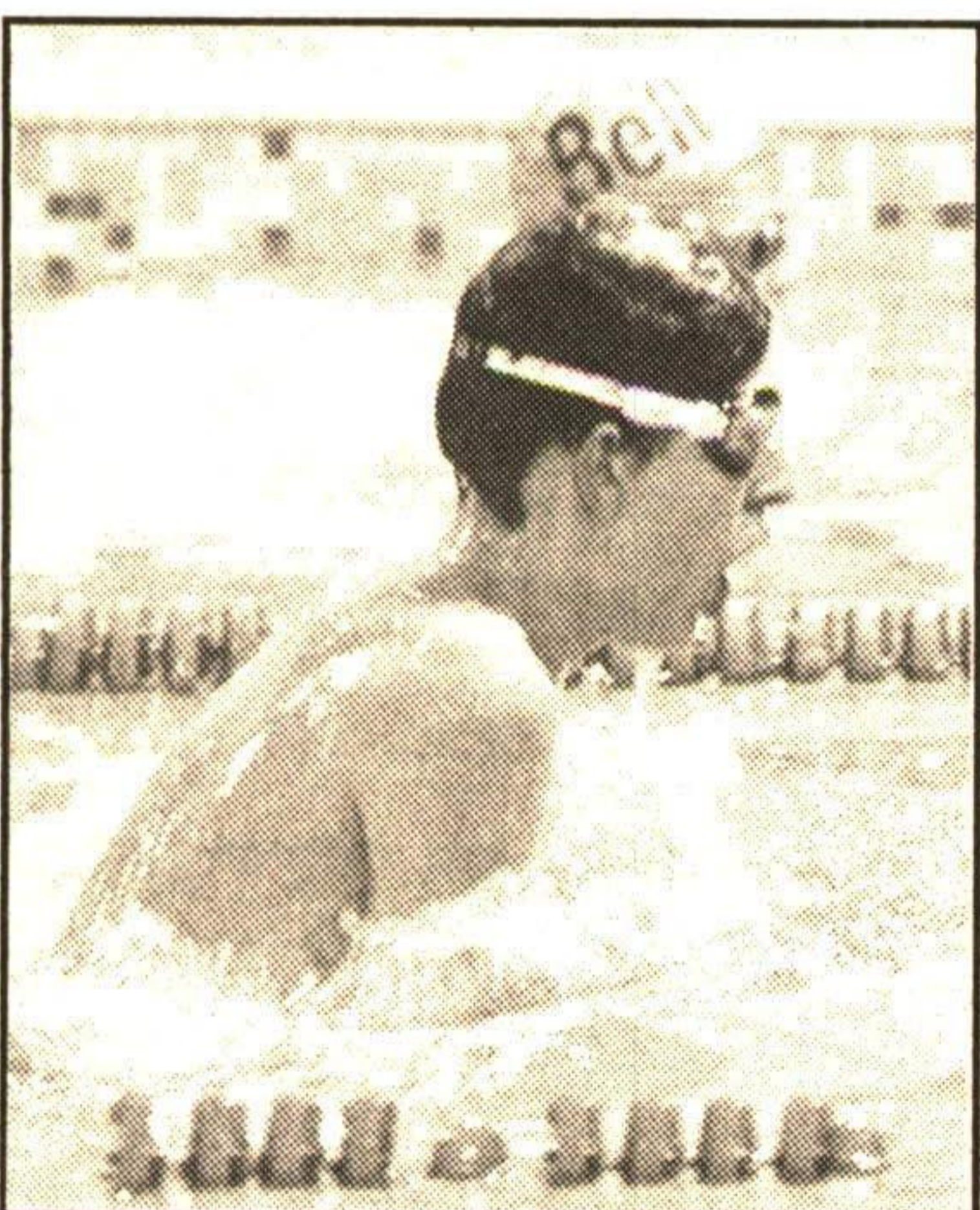
There were some close calls in limehouse Inter-plant Slo-pitch action last week.
