Sunday shopping begins today

Sunday in Halton Hills will be a shopping day, start-

ing today.

Wednesday Premier Bob Rae announced a free vote on the Sunday shopping issue, and the vote could be held as early as Thursday. Until then, police have been advised by Attorney General Howard Hampton not to press charges for stores which chose to open.

As a result, many of the major retailers, including Zellers, are expected to open on Sundays, starting this week. Even many independently-operated Halton Hills

businesses plan to open Sunday.

"I'm thrilled that we finally have Sunday shopping," said Mary-Ellen Stephens from Final Touch, the vicechair of the Georgetown BIA. "I lived in the Bible belt in the United States for 10 years, and the stores there

were always open. You couldn't find more family-oriented people, but they always found time for their families." Her store will be open from noon to 5 p.m. Sundays.

Stephens knows other downtown stores will also open. She will likely hire a student for the rest of the summer to work Sundays, so the new proposed legislation will generate a part-time job, even in her small business. Stephens is looking forward to doing her grocery shopping on Sundays, and her husband is looking forward to no longer having to do the shopping on Saturdays.

But Emily Grezoux, manager of Georgetown Photo, was disappointed in the news. "Sunday is my day to get caught up on the book work and do other things. But if everybody else opens, we'll probably end up opening too, and I'll end up working myself," she said.





dominates RSI hearings

The preliminary environmental hearing into the Acton dump proposal ended for the week Friday, not with a bang as some had hoped, but with a whimper.

Due to the long list of speakers on both sides of the issue, along with their in-depth arguments, the five days originally scheduled for the entire hearing was used up rather quickly, without any decision from the three hearing officers.

The hearing will likely be reconvened within the next

few weeks.

In the meantime, the officers are to rule on whether or not they favor the town's and region's arguments that a full-blown hearing should not take place because Reclamation Systems Inc. (RSI) didn't follow stringent provincial guidelines in its application for a landfill. RSI is intent on dumping 20 million-plus tonnes of garbage into the Acton Quarry over the next 20 years.

This week's hearing was to determine who the players are, what the issues are, who will require financial assistance to pay for lawyers and consultants during the main hearing, and so on. At that time evidence, examination and cross-examination of witnesses will occur, if it reach-

es that stage.

However, this week's hearing was bogged down in lengthy "legalese" arguments, so all there was time for were the presentations from the town, region and other individuals, and RSI's rebuttal to them.

Throughout the week, handfuls of interested residents filtered in and out of the proceedings, which were held at the Acton Legion. Most appeared impatient at the slow pace of the hearing, as they were anxious for a decision to be made as soon as possible.

The community, in the form of groups such as POWER (Protect Our Water and Environmental Resources) and FOAD (Furiously Opposed to Acton Dumping) has been fighting RSI's proposal for about six years now.

The town's and region's strategy (at this stage), if successful, will likely delay, or kill, RSI's proposal.
