

A million dollar winner

Georgetown's newest millionaire is very happy, and a little scared.

Tuesday Marcey Williamson discovered she was the lucky winner of \$1 million. Her number was drawn in one of the 10 bonus 649 draws on Saturday, June 13. The additional draws were held to commemorate the 10th anniversary of Lotto 649; Williamson was one of two winners who didn't have to share the prize.

"Holy smokes, now I'm rich," were her first words at the Ontario Lottery Corporation in Toronto.

Marcey, 23, and a lead hand at Standard Products in Georgetown, has lots of plans for her money: buy a house, a new car, help pay her parent's mort-

gage, go on a shopping spree for a brand new wardrobe, and help her two brothers and sisters.

"I'll go crazy for the first couple of months, but I have enough smarts not to go crazy and spend the whole thing," she said. "I'll invest it, and hopefully I'll be set for life."

Marcey would also like to travel for six months, but thinks she'll be bored if she doesn't eventually go back to work.

"I feel great. I think I'm still numb. I haven't screamed or anything yet," she said.

Marcey had been playing Lotto 649 on and off for four years. Usually she plays with a group of people, but last weekend

when camping in Mount Forest, she felt she had to go into a variety store and buy 10 tickets for \$1. Marcey let the machine choose the numbers for her.

"I kept telling people at work (Monday) you had better be nice to me, because I haven't checked my numbers yet," she said.

Then Monday night when she did check them, she actually passed over the winning ticket, and believed she hadn't won anything. But a friend, who was with her, noticed her winning number.

"I think you've got a \$1 million win. I'll show you," he told her. Sure enough, he was right.

6th Line residents hoping for Town water

After waiting almost two decades, residents south of Limehouse were finally given a glimmer of hope this week when regional councillors narrowly approved hooking their rural homes up to Georgetown's water supply.

The Sixth Line/20 Sideroad residents have been involved in a long fight to hook into the municipal water supply because of water quality and quantity problems in their own wells.

Up until Wednesday, region officials have repeatedly balked at the request, mostly because of the \$220,000 price tag for such a project.

However, approximately 30 out of the 40 homeowners in the area recently approached Halton Region, which is responsible for water, proposing that they pay the full costs of extending a water pipe from Georgetown and installing services. They are only about two kilometres away from Georgetown's supply.

That offer was agreeable to the majority of councillors, who went against regional staff's "strong opinion" to deny the request.

Following regional chairman Pete Pomeroy's suggestion, councillors threw the matter back to the planners to draft an agreement where the new servicing will be limited only to the existing homes.
