
## Crossing guard

The day's opening ceremonies kicks off at 12:45 p.m. with the cake cutting and the naming of Glen's Citizen of the Year.

A range of special prices and activities will be the order of the day at Georgetown Golf and Country Club on the corner of River Rd. and Mayfield Rd. Admission and parking are free. Haircuts, hamburgers and hot dogs are all \$1.25. There will be a large outside flea market, clowns, face painting, a putting contest and hourly draws. An all you can eat breakfast will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., and children under 5 can eat for free. Rides on a Space Ball, which is a flight simulator, will appeal to people between 5 and 50 years. A free dance will be held from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. with a live band and feature attractions.
