# Grier rules Acton Quarry expansion can't be restricted

Acton Quarry owner United Aggregates Ltd. cannot be restricted from expanding its mining operations across 22 Sideroad under the Environmental Assessment Act (EAA), minister of environment Ruth Grier announced this week.

"I have been advised by legal

counsel with both the ministries of Environment and the Attorney General that the working of the south part of the quarry cannot legally be designated under the EAA," Grier stated in a press release.

Two years ago, protest group EAGLE (Ecology Awareness Group Landscape and Environment)


