"There is a great need for more ball diamonds in Halton Hills. I hope that the different leagues in this community can work together and voice this concern to the town," says Courchesne.






RSC initiated the tournament because "we are two likeminded organizations with the same goals," said RSC spokesman Jim Ritchings.




