Kingsmill residents request less parking and fewer playgrounds

A call from residents of a new cooperative development in Georgetown to reduce the number of playgrounds and visitor parking spaces surprised local politicians, who felt uncomfortable granting the request Monday.

Instead, they followed councillor Pam Johnston's suggestion to reduce the number of parking stalls by four, and not the 10 spaces requested by the residents' rep Susan Johnston.

Johnston, president of the Kingsmill coop association on Mountainview Rd. and River Dr., explained to council that 10 of the 85 visitor parking spaces are in "offensive locations," and infringed on residents' property and privacy.

Also, she complained that the four planned playgrounds, complete with Jungle Gyms, are unsightly, and would prefer one central area for the kids to use.

"We want to design our own playground area, and maybe we could request (the developer) Law to set aside his equipment and funding for us to use," Johnston said. "There are too many playgrounds and they are poorly located...It's not that we don't want the children to play, but we'd rather have green spaces instead of all that playground equipment."

However, councillors were taken aback that residents were asking for a reduction, when in the past they have often been confronted

Get rid of the weeds

Halton Hills councillor Gail Rutherford suggested that the town, Credit Valley Conservation Authority and residents form a crew to eliminate purple loosestrife from the area. She feared if the weed is not pulled up immediately, the town could be inundated by it before long. "Many groups have put the environment down as their concerns, so maybe we could get something together and make a coordinated effort," she said. Mayor Russ Miller noted that Collingwood's residents recently got together and cleaned the entire town of the weed.

with requests for more parking and play areas. They cautioned against making the reductions now, instead opting for a review of the situation after Law completes all of the development planned for the area.

"We must look at the best long term interests of the community," councillor Johnston said. "There will always be children there, so we shouldn't be removing their play areas."
