"I'm really happy, this could be a major turning point for the club," said Geniole, "We weren't very hopeful about our chances because we are an out-of-town organization."


Starting next month, the club's volunteer

The club's executive members hope to obtain a long-term lease on a new facility and move the gymnasts sometime between January and September of next year. However, there's still a lot of work to be done and decisions to be made before this happens.






Field hockey gold medal for Eccles

Georgetown teen Jenn Eccles and the Under 19 Ontario West Girls Field Hockey Team were crowned gold medal winners Monday (August 24) at the Ontario Senior Games in Scarborough.

Seventeen-year-old Jenn was part of the 13 player squad who defeated the Ottawa team 1-0 in the final match-up to win the gold.

"It was excellent," said Eccles, who will be entering Grade 13 at Georgetown District High School this year, "We all pulled together and gave 110 per cent. We just wanted to win so much more then they (Ottawa) did."

Jenn had qualified to compete with the team back in June after an impressive performance at a oneday tryout camp at Shell Park in Oakville. She was selected to compete as a centre-forward by team head coach Gail Redshaw.

Six teams from various regions across Ontario took part in this year's field hockey competition, which ran from August 20-24.

The Ontario West squad went into the final game as the underdogs because they had previously lost their second game of the competition to Ottawa 1-0. However, according to Jenn, the players never lost their confidence, fought hard the entire game, and came away the victors.

The team posted a three wins, one loss, and one tie record in the qualifying round. While losing to Ottawa, they pulled off wins against Waterloo (2-0), Toronto (2-0), and Perry Sound (3-0) and tied Peterborough 0-0.

Waterloo won the bronze medal. Jenn was very pleased with her personal performance during the four-day competition, particularly in the final match against Ottawa.

"I was extremely pleased (with my performance). The last game of the tournament was the best field hockey I've played in my whole

Jenn has been playing field hockey since Grade 9 when she joined the GDHS school field hockey team. Last season, she helped the senior squad to the Halton semifinals where they were taken down by Nelson.

She plans to attend university after finishing high school and hopes to perhaps gain an athletic scholarship and pursue her sport further.

For the moment however, she is content with just taking in the sweet taste of victory and says the entire competition was very enjoy-

"It was really fun. Everyone was there to win, but also to make good friends. We all worked extremely hard and we won."
