'Cup' weekends near

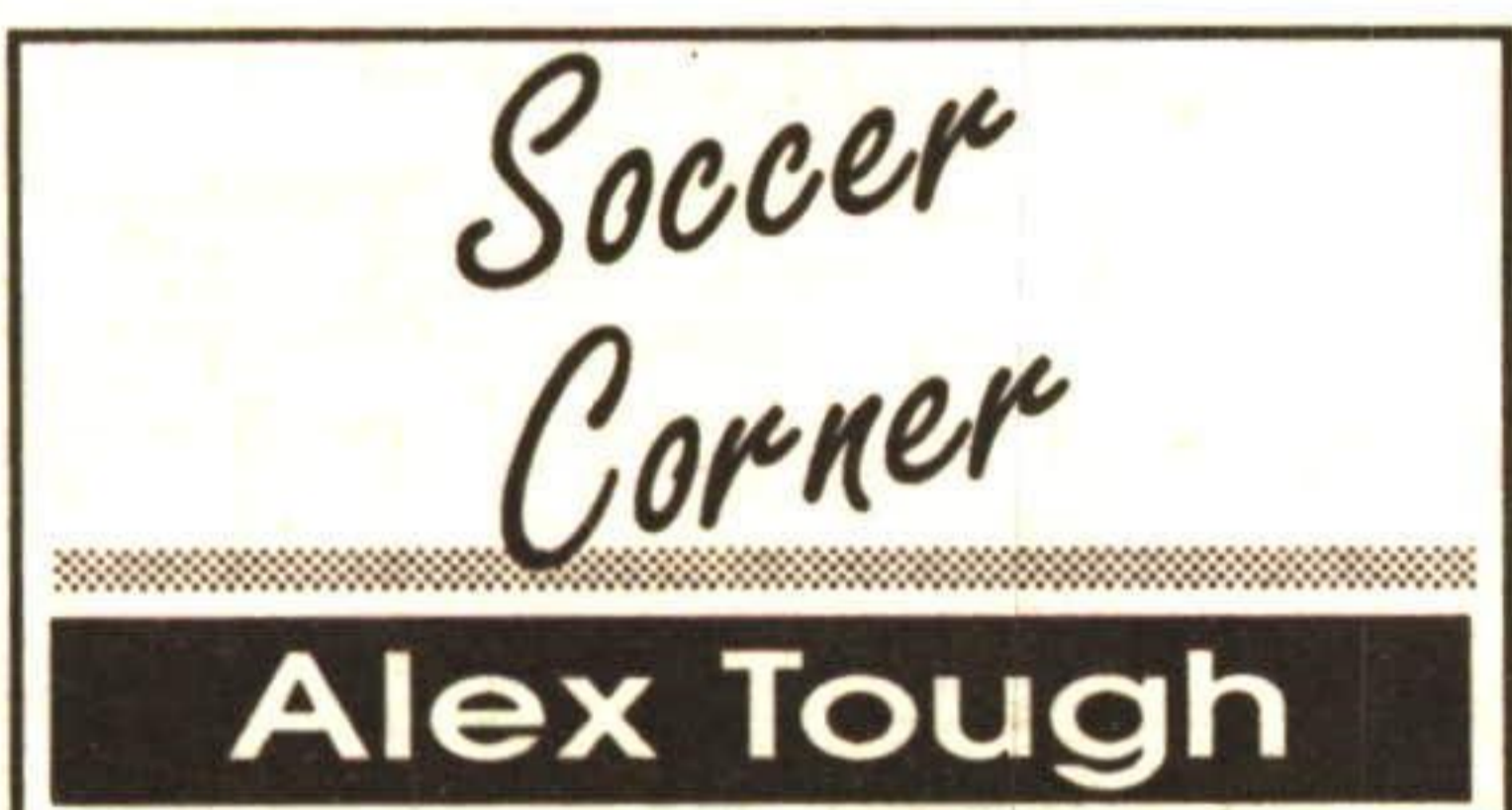
Soccer season winding down

Burlington's Under-16 girls and Chinguacousy's Under-14 boys reached the final, gold medal match, in this year's Ontario Summer Games. Soccer and baseball took place at Scarborough's L'Amoureux sports complex at the northern end of Birchmount Road. At the southern end of the road, in the soccer stadium, the athletics took place. Fortunately the weather cooperated throughout the four days of competition.

Way down in Cuba, the Canada Under-17 boys were battling for the CONCACAF Championship. 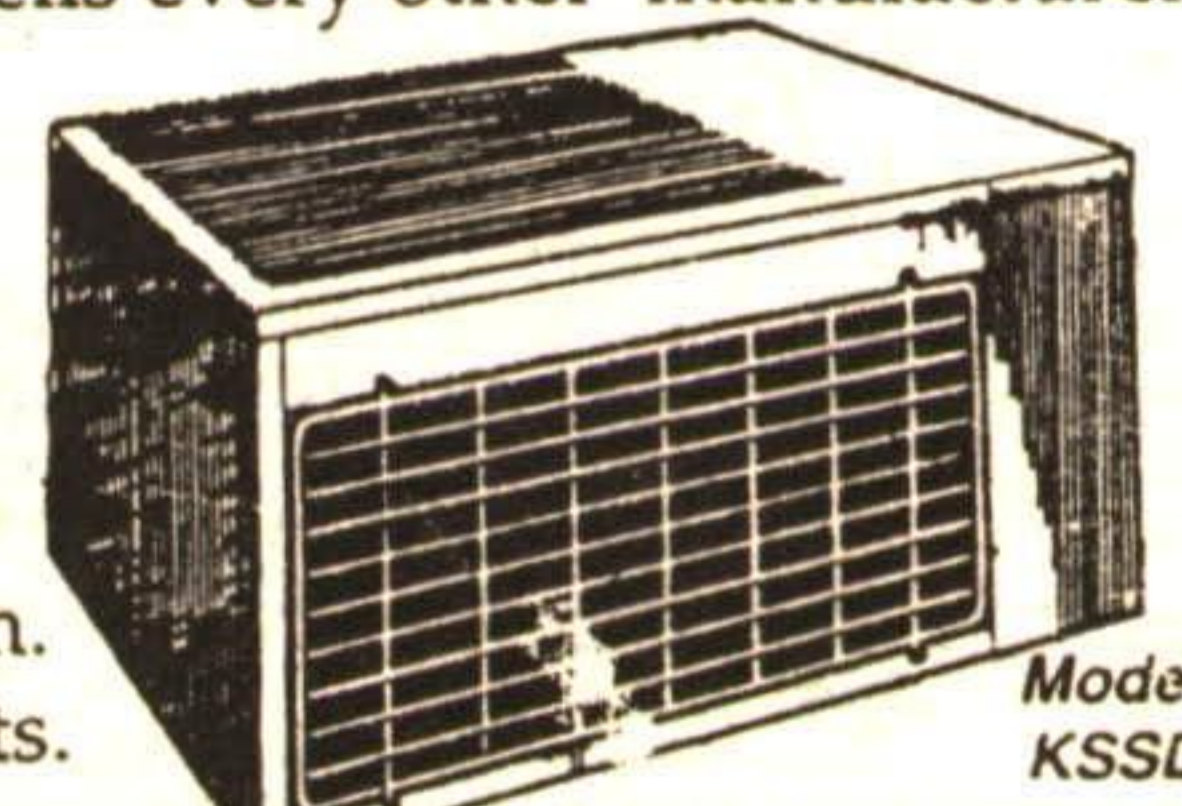
