Grand Circuit continues opening week with over \$1.7 million in stakes events headlining the racing


from September 6 through to September 12.

Spear helps Dorchester to 5th place

Limehouse native Judy Spear and the Dorchester Jesters Ladies Senior A softball squad came up short in their bid to capture the gold at the National Ladies Softball Championships in Winnipeg, Manitoba August 24 to 30. The Ontario team took a fifth place finish in the week long competition.

Judy has been the star center fielder for the Chinguacousy Rockets Ladies Senior A squad for seven years. She was selected to join the Jesters and represent Ontario at the nationals after her team was defeated in the provincial finals by Dorchester.

A total of 14 team from across the country competed at the nationals this year. The British Columbia Renegades took the gold, a squad from Alberta took the silver and capturing the bronze was the West Vancouver team. Ontario was represented by three softball teams at the nationals: Dorchester, London and Pickering.

The Jesters qualified for the play-offs after posting a four wins, two losses record in round robin competition. They went on to beat Saskatchewan in the first play-off round but were defeated 9-5 by the West Vancouver team and were eliminated from competition.

"Unfortunately, we didn't play as well as we would have hoped," said Spear, "Our top pitcher had hand problems and we made a lot of errors in the final game, mainly because of the incredible wind that day."

The teams were divided into two pools of seven teams. In round robin competition, the Jesters lost to West Vancouver and Quebec. The team scored wins against Alberta, Manitoba 1, Manitoba 2 and New Brunswick.

Spear was the team's back up center fielder during the nationals. She played in four games of the tournament including the final game against West Vancouver.

She explains that she had only one at bat in the final game and didn't really play enough to comment on her performance.

"I'm a little disappointed with the performance of the Ontario squads this year, it seems as though we could have done better."

This was Spear's third trip to the nationals. She and the Chinguacousy Rockets won the championship as the host team in 1989 and represented Ontario well as defending champions the following year in British Columbia.

Along with Spear, the Jesters picked up Rocket first-baseman Julie Boudreau and shortstop Kim Downard as well as a player from the Kitchener team.

The Jesters didn't have a coach with national coaching status so Rocket assistant coach Robin Sluce made the trip.
