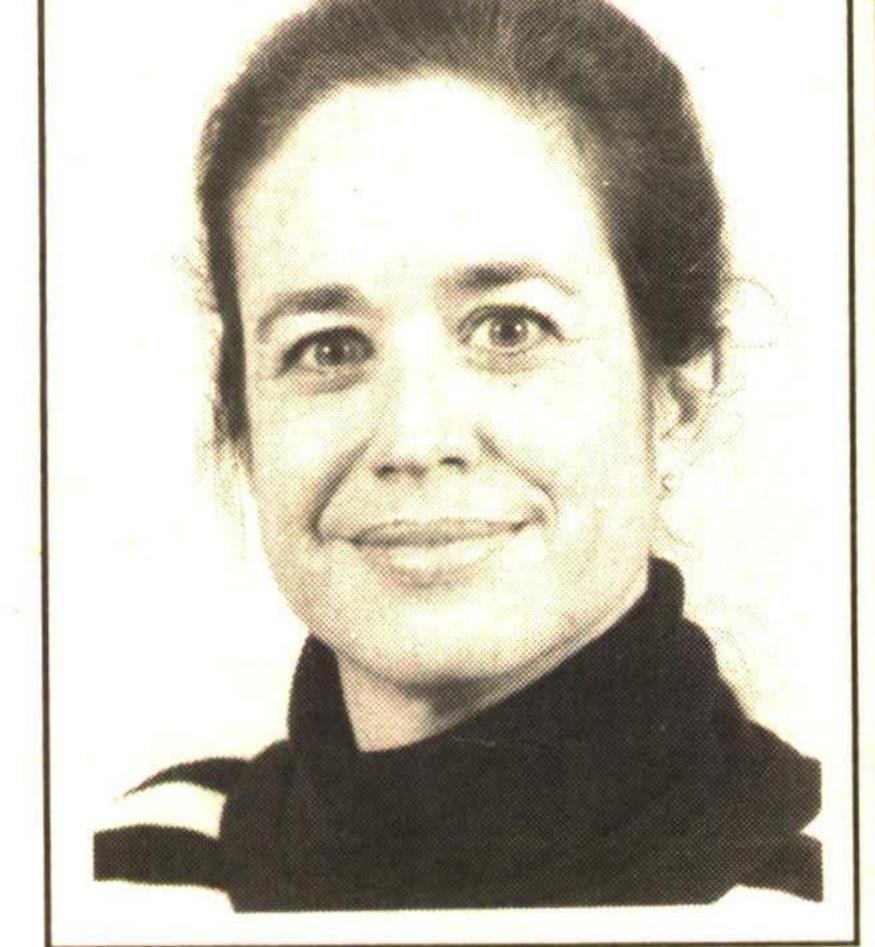

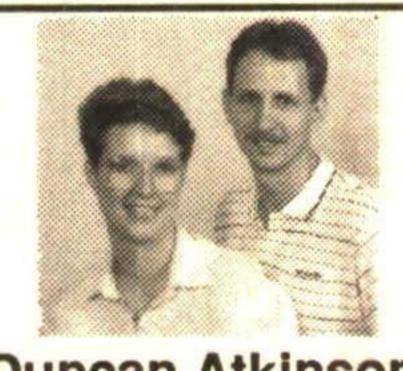

DETHATCHING YOUR LAWN

Before discussing dethatching, you must first know what thatch is and how it develops. Thatch is the build up of dead and live grass stems and roots which form a layer on the soil surface. This layer acts and looks just like a "sponge". This sponge like material absorbs water and nutrients (preventing them from reaching the roots in the soil) and forms a good harbour for insects and diseases. One half inch (1/2") is a good thickness to maintain. More than 1/2" of thatch may create serious problems down the road.

Dethatching is a word used quite frequently when discussing lawns. Quite simply it means to remove part of the thatch or control the thatch layer from building up. Dethatching can be accomplished in several ways. The two most common ways are by using either a "dethatcher"

or an "aerator".

A dethatching machine is often used improperly. This machine was designed to help control thatch from building up, not to reduce the existing thatch layer. Vertical spinning knives thin the lawn out by cutting grooves through the grass. Once completed, the excess grass must be cleaned up to avoid smothering your lawn. As long as the thatch layer is less than 1/2", this method can be effective in "controlling" the thatch from building up. Once thatch has reached a serious level (greater than 1/2"), the dethatching machine will have a tough time cutting through this layer of thatch. If this is the case, an aerating machine would be your best

An aerator does more that just allow air, water and nutrients into the soil. It also "dethatches" your lawn. It does this by physically removing plugs of soil and thatch. Once these pieces of thatch are removed from your lawn, the remaining thatch will automatically begin to break down and thin out. The soil from the plugs will break down in approximately 1 week and fall back into the thatch. This soil is filled with micro-organisms and bacteria necessary in the decomposition of thatch.

Based on the above information we feel that aeration is a better way of "dethatching" your lawn. The process of controlling the thatch in your lawn, whether the thatch is 1/2" or 2" is ongoing and should be part of your annual maintenance program.
