Helmet ruling disappointing

The Ontario Medical Association is disappointed by the National Hockey League's recent decision to make the wearing of helmets optional for its players.

"For years, the OMA has promoted the mandatory use of helmets and proper face shields at all levels of hockey to prevent injury and suffering," said Dr. Rocco Gerace, chairman of the Association's Committee on Accidental Injuries. "After so much success in building awareness of the importance of wearing protective equipment when playing sports, this move by the NHL is very regressive and a blow to the promotion of public health."

Dr. Gerace said sports figures act as important role models for children. "Young people will be greatly influenced by seeing professional hockey players discontinue wearing helmets, and want to emulate them," said Dr. Gerace. "This can only lead to more head and eye injuries." The OMA urges the NHL to reverse its decision.

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Georgetown juveniles are U.S. bound

Local hockey coaches Terry Wees and Jay Anderson are taking big steps this season in order to change the face of juvenile rep hockey in Ontario.

Wees, who coached midget rep hockey last season, got together with former Georgetown Junior hockey star Jay Anderson earlier this year and discussed ways of increasing exposure for local juvenile rep hockey players.


There are few local juvenile rep hockey teams in the immediate area and because the league Georgetown is in, the AAA Tri-County League, covers such a great distance across Ontario, there are few tournaments where talented hockey players can be seen by NCAA university and college scouts.

Wees and Anderson have been in contact with several American Junior hockey clubs and have been invited to

participate in three American Junior S h o w c a s e Tournaments this year.

"Juvenile hockey has been considered a dead end for many years," said Anderson, "We've decided to try and make it a stepping stone for the players with these showcase

The two coaches' hope it's that exposure at these tournaments which will help land some of the players university and college scholarships, and a chance to further their hockey careers.

During these three tournaments, profiles on each local player will be provided to the scouts.

The juvenile team will first travel to New Hampshire September 26 and 27, then to Philadelphia the weekend of December 18 to 20 and finally to a showcase tournament in Western Massachusetts February 12 to 14.

The Georgetown squad will also host their own weekend tournament October 31 to November 1. This will be a four-team tournament with junior teams from Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, and Rochester having already been invited.

In addition to these tournaments, Georgetown will compete against the Canisius College hockey team of Buffalo in a two-game series this year. The first matchup is scheduled for November 6 in Buffalo while game two will be held in town on December 5.

"We are looking to establish a foundation for a good international hockey relationship with universities and colleges in the States," said Wees, a veteran hockey coach of 20 plus years.

As far as the two coaches know, these American Junior Showcase Tournaments have never included any squads from Ontario. Hopefully their initiative will open the door for many juvenile hockey players across the province.

Head coach Wees hired Anderson for the position of assistant coach earlier this year, stating that his credentials are outstanding. Anderson played junior hockey in Georgetown and recently returned from Manitoba where he coached hockey at Brandon University.

Joe Moneypenny is the team's other assistant coach and acting manager for the team this season is Don Pearson.

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
