Recently a nine year old had to pay \$2,000 for a special helmet, another paid \$3,000 for goalie pads and so on. It is obviously worth it for the relative parents and hopefully the equipment lasts for a long time, sizes and growth permitting. One of Gerry's prerequisites for players is good skates, good blades and uppers are a must. If you cannot skate and cannot get the correct support you are done. Similarly in soccer, the feet are the things which support the player and good boots are the starting point. It is not always good for the player to wear hand downs or second hand equipment although this may be a financial necessity at times. Other feet have formed the soles and no two sets of feet are exactly the same.

We also touched on coaching.

Gerry believes that it is best for a coach to be removed from the parents of youth players as much as possible. With the best interests at heart a parent, and I am one, sometimes attempts to gain favor with the coach or manager and this can be detrimental, especially to a good coach. Coaches often have to be parental in outlook, a psychiatrist, mentor and bossy towards the charges. Teaching the skills of the game are paramount for me, and one is never too old to learn something new.

It was a pleasure to spend a little time with another sport's notable and there is no doubt in my mind that Gerry Inglis is one of the town's great sports persons. Of course, his family originally came from Scotland and more directly, he is a Glen resident.

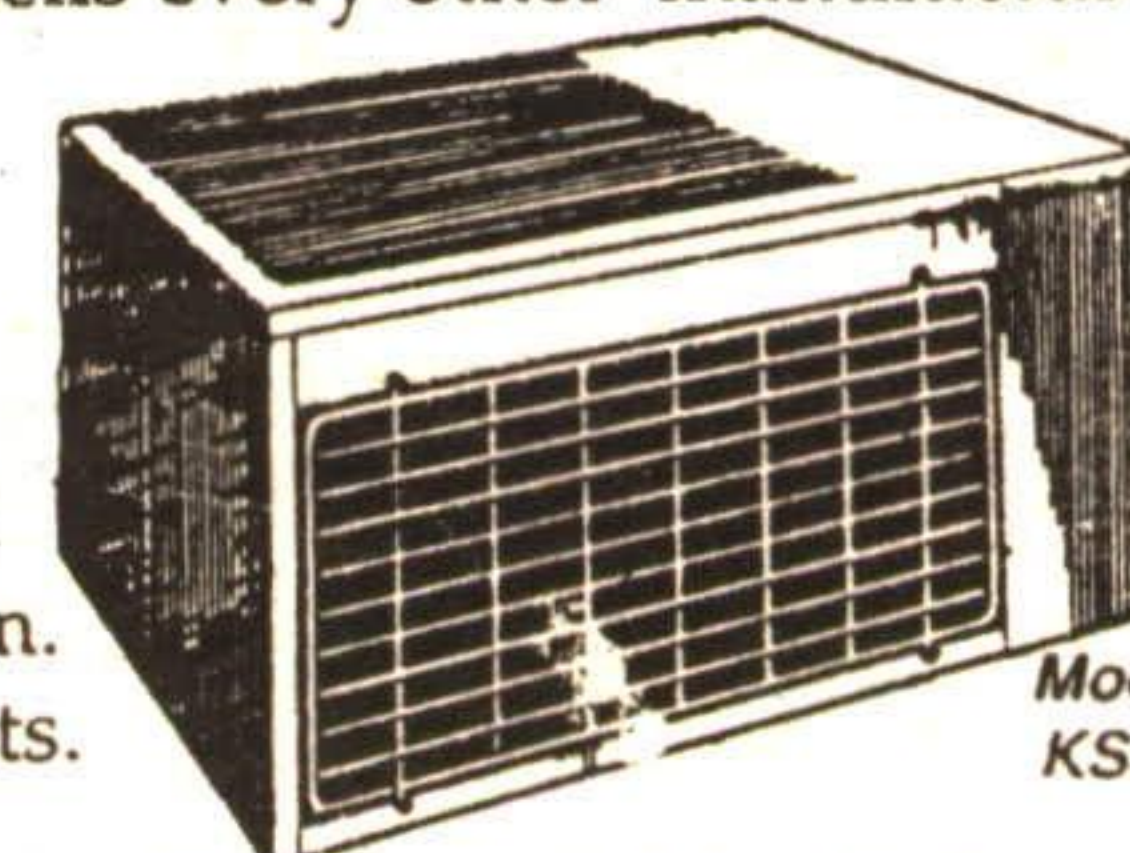
