What is a Satellite system?

It initiates with a signal that is beamed up to a satellite (bird). The bird is located over the equator 23,000 miles out in space, within the Clark Belt. It all comes together in your viewing room, 1/4 of a second later.


What is a satellite system comprised of?

To start with, a dish (reflector) which can range in size from 1 metre to 10 metres. In our location, here in Canada, the precise size is, and always will be (for this decade anyhow) 10 feet. The signal is reflected from the collector (dish) to the antenna, which is located in the feedhorn (the focal point of the dish), under that "funny looking" cone. The often "Christmas Tree Bulb" wattage signal, is then amplified by the low noise blockdown converter (LNB) and, you see and hear the exquisite result on your T.V. In your viewing room, once the amplified signal travels down a coaxial cable into a satellite receiver which is connected to your T.V. Add an actuator (arm, jack, piston) at the dish, and you are all set to view 18 C-band birds.

What does it cost me to have this "MAGIC" in my viewing room?

To have it installed expertly by a qualified and reputable satellite dealer, start at approximately \$2,500 for the most basic system, and then, based on your viewing requirements, add on from there. Enhance your satellite receiving system (earth station), with the addition of your home theatre, and now you are talking "MEGA MAGIC" !!! The possibilities are infinite!

A Man Called Norman viewed in Belfountain


The award-winning movie, A Man Called Norman will be shown at Belfountain Church on Friday, Oct. 16, 7:30 p.m.
