

#### GREEN THUMB GARDENING



# By CHRISTINE COLE PROTECTING YOUR PLANTS FROM ANIMALS AND RODENTS

One of the tasks that should be considered each fall in the garden is protecting desirable plants from animal and rodent damage. The bark and twigs are most desirable as a good source to mice, rabbits and deer. Shrubs that they find most attractive include fruit and shade trees (crabapples especially), euonymus, roses, hibiscus, burning bush, and some junipers. The following is a few products that will deter them from your plants.

spiral tree Guards: Are a strip of flexible plastic that are in a coil. They can be quickly coiled around the trunk of trees to protect them from hungry rabbits & mice. However, if the snow is particularly deep, the rabbits may be able to reach the branches above the tree guard. These guards work especially well on young fruit and shade trees, but once the trunk diameter gets larger, they are of little value.

RODENT REPELLENT: is a liquid that can be painted or strayed (diluted with a little water) onto the trunk and lower branches. It may be applied at any time of the year to repel mice, rabbits and deer from fruit and ornamental trees as well as rose shrubs. Each application will last for several months.


