Farmers' market's opening is delayed

The ministry of transportation has stalled plans for a new farmers' market north of Georgetown on Trafalgar Rd.

Three Erin residents were set to open their new business venture just in time for Christmas, but ran into a wall of bureaucracy when they attempted to gain the necessary permits to operate from the Niagara Escarpment Commission.

Before the NEC will allow the business to operate (the market is located within the NEC's planning area, south of Silver Creek on Trafalgar Rd.) they must conduct a traffic impact study for the ministry of transportation.

So far, 40 businesses had committed themselves to setting up shop in the market before the holidays, but now they will have to wait until early February to sell their

The market will feature food and produce from area farms as well as a flea market of sorts for local craftspeople and artisans to offer their merchandise.

About 10,000 square feet of floor space within two buildings is available, half of which will be devoted to food stalls, while the other half will feature crafts and other goods.
