



Conservation Authority launches publication on Halton's environment

A new tabloid called Focus on Conservation has just been launched by the Halton Region Conservation Authority.

The newspaper is being published every six months to provide information on Halton's natural environment, as well as a guide to the programs, services and facilities of local conservation areas.

Focus on Conservation includes a six month calendar of events that lists dozens of interesting family activities that are available at Halton conservation areas from January to the end of June.

The publication also has over a dozen value vouchers with free passes to the parks and good discounts on certain services. There is even a children's section on the environment called "Leaf, the Kid's Environment Page."

Brian Penman, chairman of the Conservation Authority, says, "Halton has a rich natural heritage of significant resources including wetlands, forests, and Ontario's wall, the Niagara Escarpment. The authority wants more people to know about the local natural resources and how they are being conserved."

Penman will be providing editorial comment about issues and matters concerning Halton's natural environment in each issue.

The scope of the tabloid goes beyond Halton's watershed with a section on Ontario conservation areas and the Niagara Escarpment. There are 380 conservation areas in the province that attract 4.5 million visitors every year for recreational and educational experiences. Readers will be able to learn more about these areas and topics about the Niagara Escarpment.

The tabloids are free and can be picked up at any Halton conservation area, local library, municipal town halls and several commercial

outlets. Any businesses, schools or retail outlets wishing to distribute the tabloid can do so by calling the authority at 336-1158.

Communications officer loses battle with cancer

After a courageous battle with cancer, Terry James, communications officer with the Wellington County Board of Education, passed away on January 9, 1993.


Mrs. James joined the board in 1987, developing a strong communications network within the board and throughout the school system. During her five and a half years with the board, Terry's dedicated leadership in the area of public relations put the board "on the map" locally, regionally and provincially.

Always utilizing excellent communication strategies and interpersonal skills, Terry was largely responsible for the development and implementation of the board's first three-year communications plan which began in 1990. This plan is a tribute to her commitment to promote open, honest and meaningful communication. Her efforts systematically expanded the vision of effective communication with the Wellington County Board of Education.

Positive relationships between the board and the media were fostered due to Terry's expertise, resulting in increased coverage for schools and system events. She created "Storyline" - a monthly publication that provides leads on stories and photo opportunities for the media and was personally responsible for the development of a Brochure Series for the public on various board programs.

Prior to joining the board, Terry had 12 years experience in the field of journalism, working in media-related positions in Elora, Kitchener, Waterloo, Mount Forest and Arnprior. She was a graduate of Laurier University with a B.A. in English and Sociology and of Conestoga College with a Diploma in Journalism. In 1987, Terry received an Ontario Community Newspaper Award from the Ministry of Citizenship and Culture for outstanding published articles in the fields of arts, heritage and citizenship.

In June 1992, the board presented Terry with the Chairman's Quality Plus Award, in recognition of her efforts to promote public education in Wellington County. Terry James will be remembered fondly by board employees and trustees as well as numerous parent and community groups.


