Hatchet not always an indispensible tool

Ever since I can remember camp guides have claimed that an axe or hatchet is an indispensible tool for anyone spending time in the out-of-doors and to this day I can't understand why.

When I first started to camp-out I packed along a small hatchet, but finally, after never finding a need for it, I stored it away in the garage. Years later, after spending a Saturday cleaning the garage, I blew the dust off my old hatchet, gave it back its edge and stuffed it back into my pack. The next day I decided to drive out to a chain of lakes just 30 minutes from home and spend the night under the stars.

The sun had set by the time I arrived on the lake I decided to make camp on, so under the light of the moon I searched the backwoods for firewood. With the site being a popular spot there wasn't much to choose from and I ended up with only an armful of birch 12 cm in diameter previously cut by a camper equipped with a lightweight chainsaw. I had no other choice (at least I thought at the time) than to unpack my handy hatchet and split the wood into kindling.

In the haste to get a warm fire going my first swing of the hatchet ended up glancing off the wood and embedding itself into the top of my right hand.

The cut didn't bleed right away, so I figured it wasn't that bad. But by the time I unpacked my first-aid kit my hand was covered in blood. It took three changes of gauze and

half a role of surgical tape before my hand stopped bleeding along with an entire bottle of Tylenol to control the swelling while I paddled out to the road.

Needless to say the hatchet was put back in storage and I have yet to take it out of the garage since.

So how do I gather enough wood for a fire without the aid of an axe or hatchet? First off, if you can't find enough dried sticks, ranging from finger to wrist size, lying along the forest floor, then you're building your fires way too big. By simply snapping the wood across your knee (never try to stomp on the dried branch or you'll end up with half of it embedded in your eye), a nice bed of coals can be made to sizzle that tasty fish fillet

If I was to choose any wood cutting tool to pack along other than the axe or hatchet it would be a folding saw. Campers agree that an axe can do anything a saw can do, as well as hammer in tent pegs. Well, in defense of the saw, with today's high fashion dome tents pegs are no longer mandatory item and I have yet to have a light weight saw slash open my hand.


