

BLUE BOX PROGRAM UPDATE



On February 1, 1993, Laidlaw Waste Systems Inc. commenced collection of all curbside recyclable materials on a bi-weekly basis. In addition to this change of service a number of new materials were added to the recyclable waste stream. These new items include polystyrene, HDPE bottles, aluminum foils, boxboard and fine papers. The addition of these materials and the less frequent collection schedules will undoubtedly fill your Blue Box up more quickly. The Town of Halton Hills' Public Works Section would like to offer these suggestions to help maximize the amount of materials you can fit into your present blue box;



- 1. Flatten your tin cans and P.E.T. bottles.
- 2. Flatten your HDPE bottles
- e.g. bleach or shampoo bottles
- 3. Bundle your newspapers, magazines, books, cardboard, catalogues and boxboard and place them beside your blue box for collection.

The Town of Halton Hills cannot supply a second box to residents who need another because of space limitations. We will supply a second Blue Box at no charge to those residents whose original box has been lost or stolen. In the event that these space saving ideas do not help we suggest that additional Blue Box type containers may be purchased at local hardware stores.
