

Several learn CPR life-saving procedures

The two CPR training sessions held Saturday at the Georgetown District High School were a life-savoring success..

More than 150 participants joined in the theoretical and practical training to earn their one-year basic CPR certificate.

Halton/Mississauga Ambulance instructor Peter McMurrough, led off the program with a one-hour talk on recognizing the signs and symptoms of a heart attack, what to do about it, how to access the health care system, and most importantly, "prudent heart living."

McMurrough said prevention is the '90s' approach to CPR training and the public needs more information on the causes of heart problems: diet, exercise and stress levels, because too often, the cures come too late. "They need to be educated on what causes heart attacks, become aware of the symptoms and recognize why they are doing CPR," McMurrough said.

McMurrough said that a member of the public who knows CPR can sustain a life until help arrives.

"The general public is the first system to go into effect in the first crucial four minutes with a heart attack victim. McMurrough said that in an ideal world there would

be an ambulance within every three square kilometre radius; Halton has two, serving 450 square kilometres. "With a member of the public administering CPR in those first four minutes, the ambulance arriving to take over for the next four

minutes and transferring immediately to hospital, you have a 43 per cent survival rate. Without that first step, it drops down to a 10 per cent survival rate," McMurrough said.

McMurrough said the turnout was excellent for the courses and it

would create a "domino effect" within the community.

"These people will tell their families and others what they've learned, and they will become teachers," McMurrough said.

"Today they will also learn to save a person who is choking. Choking kills as many people as coronaries," McMurrough said. "It is really sickening watching a person choke to death and not knowing how to save them."

McMurrough said that everyone who volunteered their time on Saturday should be commended.

"These people are all here on a completely volunteer basis and I think that shows their strong commitment to their community," McMurrough said.

"That is the irony of the problem facing the ambulance system. It is very frustrating, because we are forced to rely too heavily on volunteers. We need more full-time staffing," McMurrough said.


Halton Hills Ambulance Service coordinator Wally Williams said they now have 60 volunteer members of their team. "We put on a major drive about 18 months ago and we pushed the membership from 40 up to 60," Williams said.
