



## Exchange program offers chance of a lifetime

AFS (American Field Service)
Interculture Canada provides
youths with the opportunity to drop
into another country for six or 11
months and get a first-hand look at
the culture.

The world-wide exchange program has been around since WW2 when it was started by a group of American ambulance drivers to promote peace and understanding of other cultures.

Claire McAllister-Gass of Georgetown is the volunteer coordinator in this area for the exchange program, designed for 16 to 18 year old students.

Her family hosted Joaquin Jiminez, a 17-year-old Costa Rican boy, in their home two years ago.

"It was a great experience," said McAllister-Gass. "My kids got along great with him and picked up some Spanish. We are going to go spend Christmas with him, we consider him a member of our family."

She says along with participants the program is in need of host families. Rewards are reaped by both the students and the host families.

Participants spend six or eleven months in the host countries. Special six-week programs are also offered in some Central American countries.

"They have many countries to choose from including Switzerland, Denmark, Thailand, New Zealand and Australia. One stipulation we have is that it has to be a stable government," said McAllister-Gass.

"The longer the students go for the better experience they will have."

McAllister-Gass says that often times the youths pick a country to go to on the basis of which language they want to become fluent in.

While in the foreign country the youths attend school, sometimes the year can be credited back home, other times it can't depending on the country.

McAllister-Gass says the students are placed on the basis of their personalities.

"A lot of screening is done on both sides. The host families are expected to treat the student as a family member."

The costs vary depending on which country the student chooses. She said a trip to Costa Rica might cost in the \$5,000 range.

That covers the airfare and an orientation program, and participants are encouraged to make an effort to raise some of their own money. They are also required to bring their own spending money.

"We have three rules; no hitch-hiking, no driving and no drugs. If the students are caught with drugs, they are just shipped home," said McAllister-Gass.

"We are looking for students with

a mature and positive outlook on life, we are not looking for someone who wants a beach holiday for six months."

Students will have a back-up

person, outside of the host family, in the country they choose to visit.
