Cup picture clearing

With less than six weeks until the eliminations for the North America Cup go postward, the picture is starting to come into focus as to who the major contenders could be for Cup X.

Scheduled for Saturday, June 26, the One Million Dollar North America Cup is Canada's richest harness race and annually attracts the best sophomores in the sport.

Theroad to this lucrative sporting event includes a few stake engagements both on the Ontario Jockey Club circuit and out of the country between now and June 19, the date of the elimination events.

Colts like Presidential Ball, Vine Street, Rlyadh and Fiddlers Fun are off to a solid start for their sophomore year and all are nominated to The Cup.

Saturday night, Tony Chiaravalle's Presidential Ball paced to a world record (on a five-eighths mile track) 1:50.3 victory in the \$197,472 Miller Memorial Final at Rosecroft Raceway in Maryland. Driven by Jack Moiseyev for trainer Bill Robinson, the victory was only his second start on the year.

The three-year-old son of Cam Fella defeated Vine Street who was unbeaten in six season starts (11 lifetime starts) prior to the Miller, and took command of the nine-horse field past the half.

Presidential Ball was North America's leading two-year-old pac-

ing colt of 1992 after winning nine races, including the Metro Stakes at Mohawk and earning more than \$799,000.

Both Presidential Ball and Vine Street are eligible to the North America Cup.

Meanwhile at Mohawk, the first leg of the Mohawk Pacing Series presented some unprecedented speed miles last Sunday night.

In the fastest of three \$15,000 divisions, Fiddlers Fun (a NAC eligible) from the Bob McIntosh stable made his OJC debut a winning one as he scored a career best and track record (for three-year-olds) 1:52.2 neck victory over Ritchies Imperial and Bunnys First.

Chapter and Verse won the first Mohawk division in a life's best 1:53.3 for driver Doug Brown and trainer Joe Stutzman.

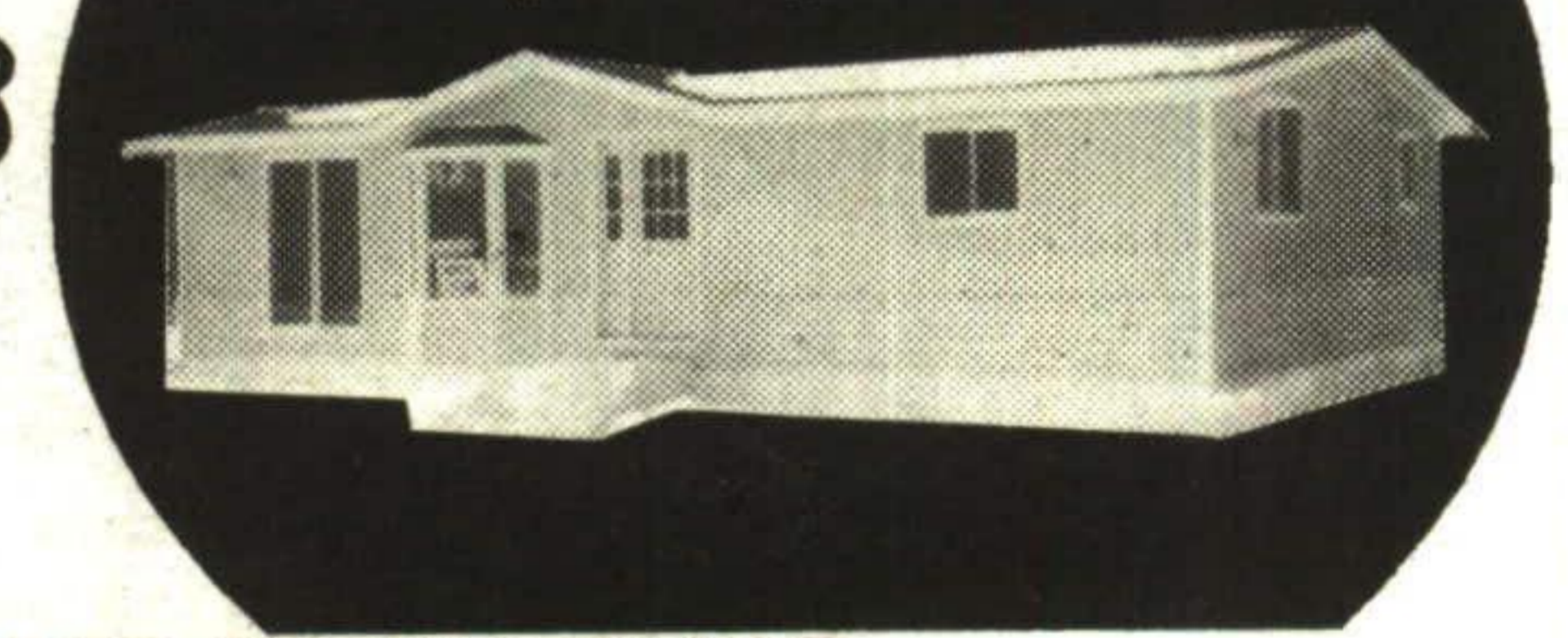
The second leg of the Mohawk Series goes postward May 15 and the final will swing in behind the starting gate Sunday, May 23.

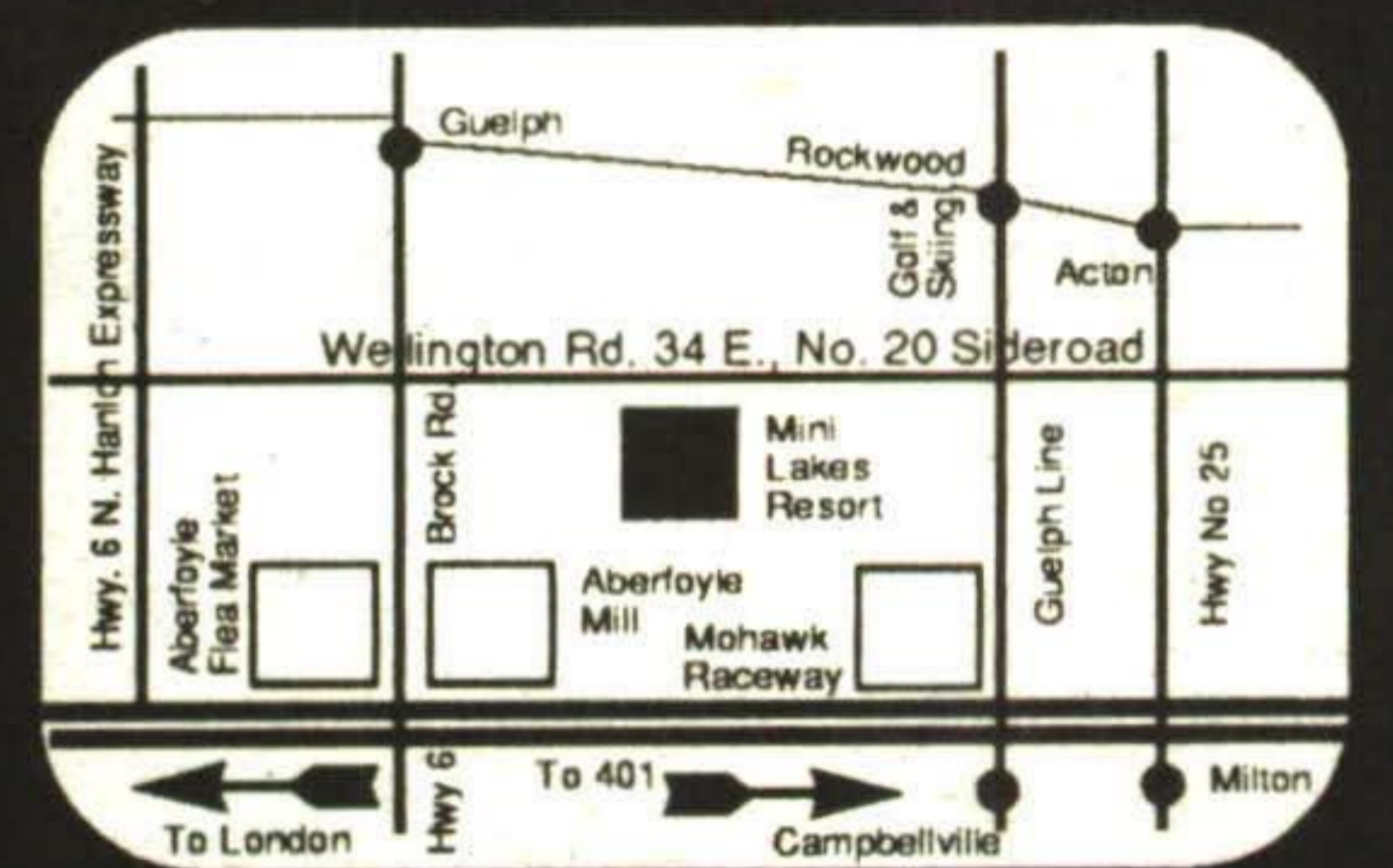

WHY AERATE YOUR LAWN?

Aeration of lawns, golf courses and parks has been a common practice for many years. Aerating your lawn annually is ideal, however every two years is sufficient. Proper aeration is done by removing plugs or cores of soil and thatch from your lawn. A hole 2-3 inches deep will do the job quite well.

Aeration will overcome a compacted soil. Compacted soils make it difficult for roots to grow, limiting the movement of air, moisture and fertilizer through the soil. It can also reduce your water requirements by relieving soil compaction. Water penetration is increased and water run-off is reduced.

If your lawn has a thick layer of thatch, aeration will push through that layer and improve air, water and nutrient penetration. This will enhance the development of a deep root system. A deeply rooted lawn will be healthier and better able to withstand drought, disease and insect stress. Aeration is most beneficial in the spring and fall.
