Crime in Halton Hills down by 18 per cent

Crime in Halton Hills has dropped by 18 per cent from the same period last year.

Police statistics indicate there were 568 reports of criminal offences between January and April in Halton Hills, while there were 123 more during the same time last year.

Break and enter crimes have dropped by 40 per cent, Det. Sgt. Mike Kingston said. They went from 63 incidents by the end of April last year to 38 by the end of April this year.

A task force of plainclothes officers has been concentrating on break and enter crimes and thefts from cars since January, Kingston said. "Local youths know we have this task force out," he said. It has

been operating since January, and will be continuing throughout the summer. Kingston believes the task force has had a big impact on these types of crime.

There have only been two robberies in Halton Hills during the first five months of the year, compared to six last year.

Kingston said that bad winter weather also helped keep the crime rate down, because youths were more likely to stay home, rather than wander around outside. In addition, break-ins tend to be more work in the winter when there is more snow around, he said.

Domestic assaults, on the other hand, have increased by 22 per cent this year — there were 28 as opposed to 22 last year.

Suspect sought in robbery

Wearing royal blue windbreaker, faded blue jeans, white runners, dark colored framed sunglasses, lenses with yellow fluorescent side arms, no accent.
