






### A winning Challenge

# Raiders to compete for Centennial Cup

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders will now have the opportunity to compete on a national level and gun for the Centennial Cup during the 1993/94 hockey season when the Central Junior League officially changes to the OHA Provincial Junior A League.

The Ontario Hockey Association (OHA) announced Tuesday morning that "in an effort to provide national competition for players within its junior program the Association will provide Centennial Cup competition through its former Central Junior League."

This decision, announced by League Chairman Al Morris following an OHA board meeting Monday night, means that the league will now have full Junior A status and that the winner of the Ontario Junior A Championship next season will have a shot at the Centennial

"The OHA Provincial Junior A League (which ceased operation after the 1986-87 season) was a credible force in Junior A competition, well renowned nationally, and we expect we can live up to its previous reputation," stated Al Morris.

While the league was called the Central Ontario Junior A League last season, it still operated under Junior B rules. With full Junior A status, the teams will now longer have to be concerned with other Junior A hockey clubs enticing their players away, as has been the case in the past.

However, the seven player import rule (a maximum of seven players from outside a team's drawing area can compete with the team) will remain.

"The seven player import rule will still be a part of the league but full Junior A status will now apply," said Morris, "This should help strengthen the league in the long

run from a recruiting standpoint. Players should be more willing to hook up with a Junior A team than with a Junior B squad. No new teams will be added to the league this season but applications may come in and be accepted in the coming years."

This announcement will help protect the league from the Metro Toronto Junior A League which has also gained full Junior A status for the upcoming hockey season.

The OHA Provincial Junior A League, which was a developing ground for many talented professional players.



The East Division will feature the Barrie Colts, Collingwood Blues, Orillia Terriers, Peterborough


Petes, Markham Newmarket 87's, Cobourg Cougars, Lindsay Bears and Ajax Axeman.

"There was concern about the seven player import rule being changed as well as a realignment of the two divisions, but both of these considerations were turned down. The only real increase in funds will be in the entry fee," said Raider President/GM Finn Poulstrup, who's executive and coaching staff support the change, "In the long run I think the change should help bring a higher level of competition to the league. We feel the advantages should far outweigh the disadvantages and we're hoping to make it work for us."

"We're excited about the upcoming season. We have 14 players eligible to return to the team and we have some interesting prospects from our spring training camp in April, which should create the framework for a good, competitive hockey club."




